The Pastor's Corner Peace and Goodness to All!

On this Labour Day weekend we take assurance from the gospel which tells us that God will repay us according to our work. Sometimes the work is not easy. The prophet Jeremiah complains of the resistance he receives from the people in the work he is called to do in proclaiming the Word of God, but concludes that he has no choice but to carry out his obligations. Paul speaks of the urgency of resisting conformity to the ways of the world as we do God's work, so that we may be transformed in heart and mind to do the will of God in our lives. Peter encourages Jesus to stop talking about the way of the Cross that awaits in his work and his destiny and he is commanded by Jesus to "Get behind me you Satan for you are thinking as human beings and not as God. Doing the work of the Lord requires that we deny ourselves the way of the world so that we may live a new life in Christ. This work often requires sacrifices and may lead to unpopularity among those who do not understand the way of life that the Gospel calls us to realize. Every parent who holds fast to the discipline of directing their children and sustaining family boundaries, knows the pressures that come with being a good parent which is God's work. The resistance it can bring from children who may not understand the reasons for their parents rules and directions can create a very real challenge in everyday life. Sometimes this work involves doing what we know is the right thing in a work situation even when it will bring us difficulties among our peers. The only satisfaction comes from knowing we have done the right thing and our integrity is preserved. In the so called sandwich generation, sometimes families find themselves having to deal with parenting children, and caring for elderly parents at the same time. In truth we are all children of God who are called to deny ourselves so that we may work for the good of others in doing what the Gospel calls us to do in the name of Christ.

When we consider the mandates of the Gospel to make or practice the corporal and spiritual works of mercy, we realize it means being mindful of the needs of others and acting to meet their needs. In doing the work involved, we meet the challenge to live the gospel. Struggling to meet the needs of the hungry, the homeless, hospitalized and imprisoned, the depressed, the misguided and the lonely is rarely easy. How we encounter the opportunities to live the gospel and manage these makes all the difference. Whether it is going to visit the sick in the hospital, or being patient with a friend, relative or co-worker who is troubled, or going out of our way to comfort someone who is troubled, it takes vigilance to be aware of the opportunities joyfully. What is remarkable is that when we do the work of the Lord it is deeply satisfying especially when we realize that in serving the needs of others we are serving the Lord in immediate ways.

Labour day also celebrates the inherent value and dignity of all human work and we remember the Church has been at the forefront of defending the rights of labourers for over a hundred years. From Pope Leo XIII in the encyclical Rerum Novarum 1891, through Quadregessimo Ano, Pius X1 1931, Mater et Magistra from St. John XXIII 1961, to Caritatis in Veritate, Benedict XVII 2009, St. John Paul II, Laborem Exercens, 2011, the Church has reiterated the value and dignity of human labor, , Pope Francis on May 29th this year reiterated that human labor is not merely a commodity but has inherent dignity and worth.
