The Friar's Nook

The Christmas season is over, you probably can tell by looking around the church. I want to thank those who helped me decorate and help me put things away. It looks a little plainer in the church as we begin Ordinary Time.

It's also a bit plainer upstairs in the Friary. It's interesting, because when I was decorating and setting up the tree, Sonya simply laid in the hall and watched everything. But when I started taking the decorations down and taking the tree apart, she wasn't having it. She went outside and waited in the cold. Maybe she thought I was going to pack her up as well, stick her in a box and put her away! But I assured her that she's safe.

As we go back to Ordinary Time in the church, I'm reminded of one of my professors at seminary who said that "There is no such thing as Ordinary Time in the church because with God everything is extraordinary." And while there is no decoration per se for ordinary time the colour is green. The reason the church chooses green is that green is a sign of life and growth. Plants that are green are alive and growing, maybe that's why we don't have brown as a liturgical colour. The green is supposed to remind us that it is during this time that we are supposed to be growing in our faith. With the bitter cold weather, we've had this past week, it's hard to think of growing except in size when we put on all the layers of clothing to go outside. And this bit of Ordinary Time can slip away from us. Because of the cold and barrenness of winter and the coming of Lent, we sometimes forget about this part of the church year. That means we forget about trying to grow in the faith and continuing to show Christ's love that we celebrated at Christmas.

Maybe it's a good thing that there's not a lot of decoration during Ordinary Time. Because that makes you the decoration. I realize that a lot of you aren't coming to Mass because of the pandemic but that does not mean that you are not called to grow this season. In fact, I hope to encounter spiritual giants in the church when everyone can return! We often think that growing is what young people do we're too old as the expression goes "You can't teach an old dog new tricks". But that's not true for dogs and it's not true for us. Even in religious life, whenever we talked about doing something new or different it was always pushed off to the guys in formation. I would remind the congregation that the guys in formation already get this and it's the rest of us that need to do the growing! It wasn't usually received well, as growing means change, and nobody likes to change, hence the term "growing pains". But, as long as we live, we are called to grow and change. I remember talking to a man who was over 100 years old and wondered why he was still here. I reminded him that every morning he opened his eyes and took a breath was another chance to be about the goodness of God in our lives. I reminded him that, sure there are things he can't do at that great age, but there's always something he can do and to focus on. The older we get the more we focus on the things that we can't do or can't do well anymore. This time in the church year reminds us not to focus on the past but to look with hope to the future, asking God each day "What is it you ask of me today".

It is my hope that we grow as individuals and together as a parish during this time so that we can celebrate the goodness and work of God in our lives and our world.
