It's Advent time in the city! You'll notice the church looking different as we move into the darkness of the year with shorter days and longer nights. In fact, the whole placement of the Christmas celebration was based on this. Into the darkness of this world the light of Christ enters, and the days grow longer as the light overcomes the darkness. I know I hate the shorter days and the early darkness, but I also know this will change. It does us well to remember that these things change otherwise, we can look forward in our lives in the midst of darkness and see nothing ahead. But we know as Christians that there is great light ahead as John wrote in his gospel "Light has come into the world and the darkness has not overcome it". Is this even something to be said for the darkness. Because of the cold we huddle together more, gather around warm fires, and perhaps even reminisce about years gone by. Not to mention the amounts of food we consume (to keep us warm).

During Advent, we even welcome and celebrate the darkness because it is a preparation the eternal light to come in Christmas. I had no reaction to the AstraZeneca vaccinations but after the Pfizer I felt like I had been hit with a bunch of baseball bats. But that has passed and I'm fine. I was talking to my 85-year-old aunt this past week and she was wondering why people who were waiting to get the vaccine haven't got it yet. It's been out for over a year, and no one has grown two heads! I told her that we are having the same problems here as they are in the States. At least her whole family has been vaccinated, so she won't have to spend Christmas alone. Although after being with her seventeen great-grand children she might want some alone time. Given that I have had baptisms almost every Saturday I guess there have been a lot of people taking advantage of the COVID lockdown!

As I mentioned, I have been able to travel to Graymoor for General Council meetings and it has been great for me. Since I am now the only friar in Canada, it's nice to spend some time with my fellow friars face-to-face. When the restrictions are lifted, I look forward to spending time with you face-to-face as well. I do hope to be able to visit your homes and celebrate parties again. (As long as I can bring a doggie bag home for Sonya.) Speaking of her, she is becoming more and more at ease with the congregation, and I have been bringing her around kids at baptisms and religious education. Both she and they love it. She is coming along slowly with her prosthetic leg. She needs to rebuild the muscles around it and since I can't send her to the gym, it's taking some time. I want to thank you for all the love and support you have shown her. She has had a rough life up until now and you are helping to provide her with a happily-ever-after!
