# The Fríar's Nook

Since last week's bulletin, the information I provided is already out of date. As you know, the province closed down the churches. Technically we are allowed ten people in the church for service, but that doesn't help us much with our Masses. So it looks like we begin the season of Advent at home.

Advent is a season of preparation, so perhaps preparing at home is a good idea. But so often we think of Advent as a time to prepare for Christmas when in fact that's only half of Advent. The other half is preparing for the second coming of Christ. We don't focus on that aspect all that much maybe because we don't want to think about the end of time! [Or perhaps there aren't many decorations available for the second coming!] But I say this so that we keep in mind both aspects of advent namely Christ has come and Christ will come again! It does little use for us for Christ to have come in time and then leave us if we don't expect that he'll return as he promised. Jesus frequently reminded us disciples to be prepared, be ready for his coming because we don't know the day or the hour when He will return in glory.

I already see Christmas lights up around the city, and we are pushed to think of Christmas. This year will be very different for most of us. Gatherings won't be happening, or if they are it will be under cover. So now is probably a good time to prepare ourselves for this. For American Thanksgiving this past week, knowing I was going to be alone I made plans to connect with my family on Zoom<sup>©</sup>. I also made a turkey dinner because I love it. Good thing too because I have a lot of leftovers! So begin to prepare now for the changes this season will bring and it won't catch you off-guard.

As to the second nature of Advent, preparing for the second coming, that's something we have more difficulty preparing for and yet it just as important. Christ reminds us to be ready, to do the good we can do today, to follow his example of showing the love of God to others so that we are ready for Christ when he comes in his glory and we are welcomed by him. I challenge you, but every time you ask yourself "Am I ready for Christmas?" think "Am I ready for Christ." The stress of this pandemic along with the stresses of the season in general can cause a downward spiral leading us to think "I can't wait for Christmas to be over." If that's how we're thinking, we need to rethink our attitude and our preparation to look forward to the coming and not the ending.

Since we are in a strange period in history, maybe now is a good time to reflect on the more important things in our lives. Life is not all about us it's about the impact that we have on others. It's too easy to get into a pity party and think about all the things that we can't do right now. Even shopping for Christmas will be hard! So let's make this Advent the beginning of a new way of looking at our lives and our world. Let us look through the eyes of the Lord who never was concerned for Himself but always cared for others. Following Christ more closely in this Advent season will assure that we are ready and prepared for Him when He returns for us!

### **HUMANITARIAN RELIEF**

In the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Philippines is struggling through one of the worst typhoon seasons in decades after six significant storms made landfall on the Southeast Asian nation in just three weeks. The Archdiocese of Toronto is now accepting humanitarian relief donations to help those affected by these devastating disasters. Most recently, Typhoon Vamco (known locally as Ulysses) struck the Philippines on Wednesday, November 11, 2020, killing 67 people and displacing about 325,000 others from their homes. This was just 10 days after Super Typhoon Goni (known locally as Rolly), one of the strongest typhoons ever recorded, damaged almost 25,000 homes in the Philippines. The Archdiocese of Toronto has partnered with Development and Peace – Caritas Canada to help the people of the Philippines. Caritas is working to provide essential emergency needs for 9,750 people affected by the typhoons in provinces of Catanduanes and Albay, Philippines. At this time, we ask the faithful to please donate to the Philippines relief effort, if they are able.
