

August 19/20, 2017: 20th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Twentieth Sunday in Ordinary Time: Isaiah 56:1,6-7; Romans 11:13-15, 29-32; Matthew 15:21-28

The last time this Gospel reading showed up in the cycle was three years ago. At that time, all eyes were on the town of Ferguson, Missouri. The police shooting of 18-year-old Michael Brown incited a protest against discriminatory practices by local law enforcement. Last week, a violent group of neo-Nazis and white supremacists descended on the city of Charlottesville, Virginia, ostensibly to protest the removal of Confederate Civil War Make no mistake, they were there to hurt that community. The images to come out of Charlottesville last weekend were disturbing and surreal. A group of Nazis beat a black man with wooden boards, while men brandishing assault rifles stood watch to stop anyone from intervening. A young white supremacist drove his car into a group of citizens opposing the protests, killing a 32-year-old woman, Heather Heyer, and sending 19 more to the hospital. Ms. Heyer was a paralegal who believed strongly in equality and justice. Groups of young men carried torches and screamed hateful things about Jews and black people. One of the more touching images to see was of a group of clergy from many different denominations, linking arms and standing across from armed Nazis.

After an exhausting week of hearing these heart-breaking stories, we come together to hear a word of Good News from scripture--something hopeful and positive. Instead, we hear Jesus call a Canaanite woman a dog. It's not quite the resounding call to unite people together despite our differences we might have hoped for. It's tempting to explain away Jesus' overt discrimination here. If we imagine Jesus wryly smiling at the woman, then we could say, "See, he's not really racist--he's just being sarcastic." While this might make the scene more comfortable for us, those details don't exist in the text. Taken on it's own, this is a tough reading to face. We're used to seeing Jesus wisely get the upper-hand against those he argues with. Before this encounter, Jesus had just finished taking the scribes and Pharisees to task for their hypocrisy. Now we see him being stingy with the Kingdom of God. The Canaanite woman gets the better of Jesus in this exchange, revealing herself to have a deep, unrelenting faith, and a sharp wit to boot. Rather than argue with the epithet leveled against her, she embraces it and turns it from an insult into a sign of great faith. "Dog" was a contemptuous Jewish term for gentile, meant to invoke the image of a spiritual mooch. The woman takes this characteristic of begging and uses it to amplify her request--if only Jesus would deign to offer her a scrap from the table, it would be enough to heal her daughter. For this, Jesus extols her faith and proclaims her daughter's healing. Through faith, the woman found a way forward through discrimination to healing.

Our faith demands that we face unsavoury realities in our midst when we would rather look away. The Kingdom of God will not come about through lounging around and hoping for the best. Faith gives us a way to connect with people and heal hurt relationships. It gives us the means to, "Observe what is right" and "do what is just" (Isaiah 56:1). What happened in Virginia has happened before, right here in our own community, under many guises. Evil can reveal itself anywhere--no place is immune. It's tragic to see divisiveness and hatred seduce so many bright, young people. We all waste our potential when we choose to do what is so obviously wrong instead of pursuing the good. Today, the Canaanite woman tells us that all it takes is a scrap, the tiniest crumb from the table, for God to work healing in our hearts. We can dare to face evil down knowing that somewhere there's a sliver of light ready to break through like the dawn.




