Fourth Sunday of Advent: Matthew 1.18-24

The Gospel according to Matthew begins with the genealogy of Jesus, a list of the forty-two generations from Abraham to Joseph. The Messiah was expected to be a descendent of these men with whom God had struck a covenant. Jesus' lineage came from his father's side, yet we hear today that Joseph essentially adopts Jesus when, on the advice of an angel, he takes Mary as his wife. God chose an unconventional family to bring Jesus into the world. It may strike us as a unique situation, but all throughout scripture God has worked miracles through unusual circumstances. Among the forty-two men in the genealogy, four women are mentioned: Tamar, Rahab, Ruth, and Bathsheba. All four women are undeservingly suspected of indecent behaviour, yet in each case prove to be more righteous than their accusers.

Tamar outwitted her father-in-law Judah, who had unjustly dismissed her and confined her to a life of widowhood. She winds up pregnant outside of marriage, so Judah tries to condemn her to death. She is able to prove that it is by Judah himself that she is pregnant, and so shows her innocence. Rahab ran a public house in Jericho and was suspected of harlotry. She attests faith in God though, proclaiming how God worked to free the Hebrew people from Egypt. She agrees to help the Israelite army capture Jericho and in exchange the invaders promised to spare her family. Through her faith, Rahab and her kin became family to Israel. Finally, the story of Ruth tells of the unflappable loyalty and love between her and her Israelite mother-in-law, Naomi. After Ruth's husband dies, she refuses to leave Naomi's side, "...your people shall be my people, and your God my God." Ruth makes a bold move to marry Naomi's relative Boaz: she uncovered him and lay at his feet while he slept. He awoke halfway through the night, startled to find Ruth under his sheet. Her daring paid off-she married Boaz and bore a son who became grandfather to David. This is how a Moabite woman became an ancestor to the Kings of Israel.

Every year our church gets swamped with people at Christmas. They come for mass, the school Christmas concert, or just for a quiet place away from the mall. For those of us who are here the rest of the year, it can be difficult to accept the influx of guests. We can rejoice though, since these visitors are a sign that God is once again working to extend this unconventional family to bring the Good News of Jesus Christ to the world. God gets creative about including those people whom we suppose are outsiders. We may find that our Lord has cast them in a central role this Christmas. Like Joseph, we don't have to be afraid that God likes to colour outside the lines.

December 29, 2013: Feast of The Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph

Feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph: *Matthew 2.13-15, 19-23*

The Jewish readers of Matthew's Gospel could recognize in Jesus' story their own narrative of faith: God's covenant with the people of Israel—revealed by the prophets over time—enacted in history. The story of Jesus' infancy parallels the Israelites as God's chosen people. God promises a child to a couple through amazing circumstances: from humble beginnings, the lowest shall be lifted up; along the way there are hardships and time in exile; and finally there is deliverance from oppression. This is meant to invoke the great names of Jewish history: Abraham and Sarah, Jacob and Rachel, their son Joseph, Moses, Joshua, and David. Jesus didn't simply drop out of the sky, but was born into a family with deep Jewish roots. Mary and Joseph's Jewish faith prepared them to welcome Jesus into their lives. Likewise, God blesses our families with faith to hold us up in both times of trouble and times of iov.

How did Joseph know it was an angel of God that appeared to him in his dreams? If a dream commanded me to take my wife and child and run away from home, I might resolve to cut back on cookie dough ice cream before bed, then I would roll over and go back to sleep. Joseph, however, got up that very night and left. This wasn't the only time he listened to God in his dreams. He changed his mind about Mary after receiving a message in his sleep, and became her husband and the father of her unborn child. When the angel of God sends the all-clear for Joseph to return his family to Judea, he does it. Oh, but Judea still wasn't completely safe, said the angel-again in a dream—better settle down in a place called Nazareth. Hope you like obscurity and poverty, Joseph, because Nazareth has both. Joseph could trust in the bedtime dispatches because he knew from his faith that God had a track record of communicating through dreams. He took them seriously because he also knew from scripture what happened to those who ignored God's commands. Throughout the turmoil of an unexpected pregnancy, an unstable political ruler, and his family's exile, God reassured Joseph through the faith that he had and knew so well. God spoke in a way that Joseph could recognize and trust.

The most privileged moments in our parish church are when we accompany families through those life-changing moments: graduations, marriages, births, and deaths. Sometimes they are tumultuous, but these moments are just as often filled with grace and love, along with worry and grief. They are times when the story of our faith comes to life. Above all else, faith tells us that the Lord acts lovingly in our lives, even when there doesn't seem to be any evidence of God at work. God speaks to us in ways we can recognize to lift our families up in celebration and in sadness.

Dear Parishioners,

Fifty six years ago some wise Jesuits founded our St. John Brebeuf School along with the guidance of the Sisters of the Holy Names of Jesus and Mary. Since then more than 15,000 students have come through our doors. Today their mission is still being carried out by our dedicated lay staff. Each person that walks through door is entrusted with the mission of Living, Learning and Serving in Christ as set out by the example of our Sisters.

In keeping with our mission statement, this year our Social Justice Committee and the Parent Council are jointly working with the students and their families to help raise awareness about hunger and poverty in our city and throughout the world. Following your example and commitment to help Winnipeg Harvest, our 275 students have committed to extending a helping hand at Winnipeg Harvest at least once this school We have also implemented an international program called "Empty Bowls" in an effort to spread awareness and fight hunger. During the next few months, each student and staff member will create their own unique bowl to symbolize those who go hungry each day and on April 27, we will share a simple meal of soup and bread, sell the bowls and donate the money to Winnipeg Harvest. As a third initiative, each classroom prepared Christmas hampers for the N.E.E.D.S Centre (for newcomers to Canada) which were delivered on December 16.

I would like to thank you for all your prayers, volunteer service and financial contributions made to provide the school with a new roof and bursary aid for many of our families who otherwise would not be able to attend our school. St. John Brebeuf School exists because of your dedicated faith and commitment.

As we approach another Christmas, on behalf of all students and staff at St. John Brebeuf School, I would like to wish you a blessed Christmas filled with love and charity.


