Epiphany of the Lord: Isaiah 60:1-6; Ephesians 3:2-3, 5-6; Matthew 2:1-12

The city of Jerusalem gave a different sense of scale to the caravan than the desert. Amidst oceans of sand and rock, the camel train seemed as trivial as a flea in comparison; but when those same hundreds of animals stretched the length of the city's walls, a true impression of its vastness could be grasped. Merchants and their entourage came carrying all manner of precious cargo: "gold, silver, jewels and pearls, fine linen, purple, silk and scarlet, all kinds of scented wood, all articles of ivory, all articles of costly wood, bronze, iron, and marble, cinnamon, spice, incense, myrrh, frankincense, wine, olive oil, choice flour and wheat, cattle and sheep, horses and chariots, slaves—and human lives." Even a relative backwater of the Roman Empire like Judea had a prodigious appetite for exotic goods.

Among this band of travellers, a few sought a treasure of a different kind. Unlike their companions, these few were not driven by adventure or profit, but by a dream of a different sort. The rising and falling of market prices did not capture their imaginations; they were attuned to the rhythms of the earth and sky. They read the signs of a shift in power: the arrival of a new king. What did they hope this change might mean to them that they sought to find its source? I wonder if some of their friends tagged along to see what all the fuss was about, jeering them along as they walked the road. Yet the few wise travellers carried on undeterred, filled with hopeful anticipation.

Upon finding the child, they fell to the ground in awe, overwhelmed with joy. The rest must have scratched their heads at the scene: a poor young Jewish girl had a baby in a barn... so what? After enjoying a laugh at their friends' expense, they would have returned to their business—unchanged. Only the three remained to bear witness to the fulfillment of God's promises. Money comes as easily as it goes, but an abundance of joy can change a person's heart forever. They knelt down and opened their chests of precious gifts to offer to the child; then they set off for home, their bags lighter and their minds clearer.

Holy Family: Sirach 3:2-7, 12-14; Colossians 3:12-21; Luke 2:41-52

Rapper Tupac Shakur applied some biblical wisdom to his perspective on gang life; he echoed John 15:16 when he said, "I didn't choose the thug life, the thug life chose me." In other words, gangs tend to attract desperate people who are out of better options. Fr. Greg Boyle, founder and director of a successful gang-intervention program in Los Angeles, Homeboy Industries, says that he's, "never met a hopeful kid that joined a gang." Kids join gangs to escape a worse situation at home. Today is a celebration of the Holy Family, but all of us have had experiences of family that were not so holy. Some situations get so bad that children are driven from their homes to seek out survival in the distorted family of a street gang.

During the Christmas season, we revel in the warm glow of Nativity scenes: the Blessed Virgin Mary kneeling in the hay, her serene gaze directed to the be-haloed babe swaddled in her arms; Joseph—bearded and clad in robes stands by her side, one hand chastely on her shoulder, while the other holds a shepherd's crook. Their situation was desperate, they were homeless and impoverished, but God promised to bless this small family beyond measure. This blessing didn't pour in all at once, but grew slowly, just as the boy Jesus did. There were growing pains along the way. Today we hear about the time Jesus went missing and his parents mounted a frantic search for him. All kinds of thoughts must have run through their heads: Was he hurt? Had he been kidnapped by slave traders? Had he fallen in with a gang of street thugs? So, it's understandable that Mary had some heavy words for her son when they finally found him, "Child, why have you treated us like this? Look, your father and I have been searching for you in great anxietv."

Jesus tested the limits of his parents' love as only a pubescent child can, running away and giving them a good scare. Seeing that he was sought after reassured him that his parents did indeed love him, and that this love had no limits. Jesus learned about God's love from his parents, who themselves had been made into a family through God's own love. God made a family for Christ, so his family could be a home for God. Our own families can be homes for God too, because God makes our families. The street gang tries to build family out of toughness and strength, but authentic love is perfected in weakness. When the child goes missing, the parent stops at nothing to find them. When the parent falls ill, the child cares for them, "even if his mind fails, be Our next session is Sunday, January 10, 12:30pm. patient with him." For better or worse, we learn how to live and how to love from our families; it's never perfect. Love is risky business—it's always precarious—and yet it's their fragility that makes families holy.


