

Lent 2018:

The penitential character of Lent is maintained; on these days penance is an important aspect of Christian life. Fulfillment of this duty involves prayer, works of piety and



charity, and self-denial by fulfilling one's obligations more faithfully and especially by observing the prescribed fast and abstinence.

The Paschal Fast is observed on Good Friday and, where possible, continued through Holy Saturday.

In the Roman Rite, including in Canada, Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of fasting and of abstinence from meat. Pastors should invite and encourage their people to do special penance on these two days.

Privileged forms of Penance are recommended, especially during Lent. These forms are privileged because they are based on the teaching of the Gospels (fasting, almsgiving, prayer, works of mercy) or because of their traditional value among the people of God (abstinence from meat).

Christian fasting obtains its full meaning when we deprive ourselves of food in order to be more open to prayer, to share more in the suffering of those who are starving and to save money to give to the poor. Fasting is a penitential discipline intended to open our hearts to God and others, a means of purification and spiritual liberation, a witness of the depth of our faith.

The law of "abstinence from meat" binds those who are 14 and older; the law of "fasting" binds those from 19 to 59 years of age. Parents and educators are reminded of their duty to introduce children gradually to the understanding and practice of penance. Adult example will be the greatest influence in this matter.

First Sunday of Lent: Gen 9:8-15; 1 Peter 3:18-22; Mark 1:12-15

Recall how, as a child, time seemed to pass so slowly. It seemed to take a decade to make it from September to Christmas, and even longer for summer to arrive. The future, ripe with encless expectation, always felt distant and inaccessible. If Advent were a person, it would be a young child, the bulk of her life lying before her crackling with promise, like an unopened present waiting under the Christmas tree. During Advent, God is envisioned as being soon to come, yet this effectively makes God seem far away.

In Lent, the Kingdom of God has come-it's a done deal. In its arrival, the Reign of God strips away the glossiness of sin and exposes it for a crippling illness. It's easy to think of Lent as an old man, his days spread over him, weighed down by their completeness and finality. The days ahead might bring some combination of Alzheimer's, Parkinson's, arthritis, cancer, and ultimately death, as possibility wanes to inevitability. In this way, Lent can seem like a very dour season, joyless and derisive of life: Christ has come, found that we don't measure up, and so now we must somehow make up for being so wretched. At least, that's what those nagging doubts tell us, but such a vision of God's Kingdom is not in the Gospel.

The Gospel shows us that God releases us from sin, not so we might wallow in regret, but to open our hearts to the Holy Spirit. This process might hurt a little bit-it's not without suffering-but it is pain with a purpose; it leads us to a life beyond compare. It hurts to set aside the things we have built up for ourselves and come to rely on. Jesus had to leave behind the cool waters of the Jordan river, away from the reassuring people and places, and venture out into seclusion to struggle with temptation. Lent is a personal time where we too try to stand without our titles, possessions, or accomplishments, to prop us up. Rather than bringing our strengths, we show up with our weaknesses to see us through this time. God will provide the ark that will see us through the flood-there is no mountain tall enough for us to stand on to see us through it. The joy of the season is that God does provide us with a life preserver as we take the plunge into the water, our pockets full of heavy stones: our sins. The surprise in Lent comes just when we expect to sink, that our hands wrap around the wood of cross, and we find ourselves afloat. God set us free from sin so we can open up: to each other, to the spirit, and to God's Son. So let go, jump in, and grab on.


