February 18/19, 2017: 7th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time: Leviticus 19:1-2, 17-18; 1 Corinthians 3:16-23; Matthew 5:38-48

There's an innate fairness to doling out hurt to those who hurt us. Tit for tat, like for like. Retaliation appeals to our sense of justice. Make the perpetrator a victim of their own crime and see how they like it. As far as systems of justice go, one could do a lot worse than a retaliatory one. It does impose a limit on punishment so that it is commensurate with the crime. The law in the Hebrew Bible had stipulations for all kinds of contingencies. Did someone cause the death of another? Was it intentional? If not, the person got a head start to run away to a designated asylum. They were exiled from the community, yet they weren't put to death. If an attacker caused their victim to lose an eye or a tooth, the punishment wasn't death, but eyes and teeth were fair game.

While scripture contains moments when God dishes out a harsh style of justice, there are also moments of mercy, when the punishment is deferred, like a stay of execution. In Genesis, Abraham haggles with God to spare the town of Sodom from destruction. He first asks God to show mercy if fifty righteous people can be found in the city, and he works God down to ten. It's a funny scene, but behind the humour it asks us how we ourselves draw the line between mercy and punishment. In the Gospel today, Jesus tells us that when it comes to showing love, we must be perfect as God in heaven is perfect. What does this mean for us when it comes to showing mercy and meting out punishment?

Jesus seems to ask the impossible. Turn the other cheek. Hand over our undershirts when our jackets are stolen. If someone takes you for a ride, go along with them twice as far as they had planned. Imagine hiring a contractor to fix your roof. They take your deposit, but never show up. The work remains unfinished. Who in their right mind would then call them up and offer to pay them double? Maybe you could be really passive aggressive about it, "Thank you for doing such a great job! Here, let me write you a check for all the hard work you put in. I'd like to reward your commitment to your craft." It might be satisfying to do this sarcastically, but Jesus instructs us to actually hand the money over. The word Christians use to describe God's undeserved love is grace. Not only is it undeserved, Grace is the exact opposite of what we are due. It's like skipping out on the cheque and being invited back to supper. While this sounds like a freeloader's field day, the flip side to grace is that it invites us to conversion, to reciprocate the mercy we have been shown. God ignores our debts, not so we can spend more, but so we can change our lives. God gives us the grace we need, so we can love perfectly. ~Tom Bailey-Robertson, Pastoral Associate
