# Why are you anxious? (Isa. 40:27, Isa. 44:21; 46:3-4, 1 Pet. 4:10, Ps. 145:15-16; 147:9; Luke 12:22-31)

Say goodbye to Ordinary Time. Bid farewell to the green of spiritual growth and embrace the upcoming purple of spiritual pruning. Does anyone miss Ordinary Time when it's in the rearview mirror? I do. "Ordinary" is where we spend the majority of our lives. It's the grocery shopping and tooth flossing, the meeting a friend for a quick coffee. It's settling into bed at the end of the day, feeling the ache recede as muscles relax. Ordinary is recognizing that whatever this day has been, tomorrow's another chance to do it again or, perhaps, to get it right. Ordinary seasons are for navigating routines, loving our loved ones, doing our duty. Look around you in these waning days before Ash Wednesday! Experience the wonder of saying your prayers, eating your meals, finishing a task, taking a breath!

Jesus addresses the ordinary aspects of life in today's teaching, which could be called Life 101. Don't worry, he says. Don't be anxious, don't freak out, don't be afraid. None of these attitudes are necessary, nor are they effective. Worry is a time suck and an energy drain. It accomplishes nothing and actually detracts from the quality of living. Worry is a spoiler that seeps into everything: our thoughts and moods, our relationships and projects. Worry deteriorates what it touches. And it betrays something significant we may not intend to reveal. It shows that our faith is not in God but in ourselves.

"Rest in God alone, my soul," the psalmist says. But instead, we rely on our own resources which, though considerable in many ways, will never be adequate to address the great mysteries of existence, like evil and suffering and death. These are the so-called liminal experiences, because they exist on the outskirts of human control. Simply put, they limit us. Evil, suffering, and death draw our boundaries for us, reduce us to scale in a vast and fathomless universe. We might worry about them, but we can't change them. The only way to live fully in the face of mortal limitation, in fact, is to relinquish anxiety and surrender wholly to confidence in God.

No one can serve two masters. For the person of faith, the first master is always God; will there be a rival? Jesus calls the rival master "mammon": not merely money, but material resources altogether. If we bank on mammon, it will undoubtedly lead us to worry. Because mammon, the material aspect of life, demands quite a lot of oversight from us. It's a fragile and flighty foundation that cannot be trusted to remain as it is. Things always change. God alone remains the same, and therefore trustworthy. Rest in God, and life becomes a worry-free zone.
