Fasting: On Fridays during Lent, Catholics aged 14+ are obliged to abstain from eating neat. Those outside of the age limits or whose

state in life (i.e. pregnancy, manual labourers, those who are ill) may be excused from the requirements of Lenten asting and abstinence, but are encouraged to take up some other form of penitence or acts of charity or piety.

From Father Mark:

I heard that once upon a time Father Murray SJ said if you count the days of Lent, Sundays are not Lenten days, so they are like little Easter days. I love hearing that as Father Murray was a very pious and holy priest. He would have taken on many Lenten disciplines and in his kindness would remind people who were taking Lent seriously to "lighten up on the Day of the Lord." With the "loss" of Sunday in these past



years, the Day of the Lord within the family situation has changed significantly - in that there is Sunday shopping, endless sports from the crack of dawn to the setting of the sun on this day, and the traditional practices of "giving up" or "taking on" Lenten practices have fallen away because the sense of fasting has slowly been dismissed.

We have come to the realization that it's the little things that can be the sacrifices, the penances of lent – the little martyrdoms. How far are we willing to go with our Lent - would we give up friendships, economic opportunities, the Internet, inappropriate fashions, coffee break critique, no donuts after mass, gossip or certain entertainment for the sake of our faith? These are small sacrifices, but because there are so few things we give up for Lent, these may be huge...they may be that lesson we teach our children, that there is a need to step away - even on a Sunday, because that may be the only time we can witness to our Lenten observance. Penance is not a punishment but a moment to practice what we preach... Father Murray would agree with me!

February 27/28, 2016: 3rd Sunday of Lent

Third Sunday of Lent: Exodus 17:3-7; Romans 5:1-2, 5-8; John 4:5-42

For the next three weeks, our readings will come from a cycle in Christian Initiation known as the scrutinies. This week, the Samaritan woman at the well encounters Jesus and gradually comes to believe that he is the Messiah. In the same way, our candidates and catechumens prepare to encounter Christ in the Sacraments of Initiation this Easter.

What distinguishes grace from other forms of love—charity, kindness, or mere fancy—is that it is undeserved. We do not earn God's affection, but rather merit the opposite: wrath, scorn, and rejection. This view of human wretchedness seems extreme, as though we were measuring humanity's esteem strictly by what gets written in online comment sections; we may feel tempted to lift up examples of humanity's innocence, generosity, and magnanimity. Sure, there are lots of neat people out there: great scientists curious about the nature of the universe; impoverished folks finding meaning and joy in the midst of adversity; nurses, teachers, fire fighters, social workers, soldiers, business owners, all of them living out service to their community. If there are really so many good people out there, then why is Donald Trump so popular? Even good people get scared, frustrated, and selfish. Search your feelings, you know it to be true—deep down we are all miserable wretches!

St. Paul didn't just know this about humans, he embraced the fact that people—himself first and foremost—are sinners. This didn't depress him though, because faith revealed the enormous reach of God's love: that even while we were still weak and unrighteous, Christ died for us. God didn't wait around for humans to lift themselves out of the mire, but dove right in to join us and to raise us up. Moses knew this too, for while the Israelites were complaining, God drew water out of a rock to satisfy their thirst. God was among them, even as they tested the limits of divine love. God's grace draws joyful life out of the hardest of hearts.

The Samaritan woman in the gospel also had firsthand experience with human contempt. She had to visit the well during the heat of noonday, probably to avoid derision from her neighbours. She was different from them, in her beliefs and in her social status, so she was likely mistreated. She had also had a bad streak with men. Her five previous husbands had divorced her, as was their right in those days, for whatever reason they wanted. Perhaps she couldn't bear them children or perhaps her husbands had wandering eyes. The man she was with now wouldn't even bother to marry her. So she genuinely taken aback when Jesus—a Jewish man—engages her in conversation and is even willing to ask her for a drink. She keeps reminding Jesus of the many barriers that exist between them, yet Jesus overcomes each one and teases out the faith that she holds deep within. He uncovers in her a hope for a redeemer, and then fulfills that hope when he reveals his identity as the one she expects. This hope becomes a wellspring in her that she can't contain, so she runs to spread the news to her neighbours, who also come to believe for themselves. God's grace can draw living water out of the hardest of hearts, so we can live with hope too.


