From Father Mark:

Thirty years ago when I was on Christmas break 4 from my first year in the seminary I was at Mass one Sunday when I was approached by a gentleman who wanted to talk to me about becoming a member of the Knights of Columbus. He spoke to me of that group of good Catholic men who gathered together in faith, in good works and in community to live out their Catholic faith. I listened attentively, and knew in my heart that if I was to be called to ordination as a priest that I would need to walk with many people of faith, of good works and of community. I received my first degree a short time later. I have as a priest always looked to my brother Knights as people of good will, who despite all the ups and downs of life, all the busyness and joy of life, of all the expectations and labour, would with great faith and sacrifice, invite, encourage and challenge me to be a Christian that reflects the code of the Knights. Today I worry about the Saint John Brebeuf Council of the Knights of Columbus because they are very small in number, but great in heart and faith, we need to invite and encourage other men to become a Knight. This is not a service club or a fraternity: it is a Eucharist based, faith living, community building group of good men. Any priest that has the privilege of being a Chaplain of his council relies and encourages his knights. If you are curious I invite you to "Come and See!!"

February 6/7, 2016: 5th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time: Isaiah 6:1-2, 3-8; 1 Corinthians 15:1-11; Luke 5:1-11

When we harden our hearts to those in need, rarely is it done out a place of malice or ill-will. Usually we turn away because we have other responsibilities. We might very well be willing to make the sacrifices necessary to help if we were unattached, but often we have to weigh the interests of others in our care when faced with the stranger at our door. Closing the door to someone in need can make us feel cold, tight-fisted, and even villainous, all while we do so out of a sense of protecting those entrusted to us: our family, our neighbours, or our friends. Writ large, this type of care encompasses the unshakeable values that all fall under the term "national security." It's telling, however, that invoking this reasoning typically yields decisions that reflect insecurity and fear more than stability and power.

In Isaiah's time, the prophet saw national well-being as inextricably linked to the care extended to the least among them: widows, orphans, and resident aliens. Isaiah saw the country as on a path to destruction by foreign invasion because of their lack of justice for these vulnerable groups. Some leaders, acting out of fear, capitulated to the threat, and many people were exiled from their homes. In the eyes of the prophet, the invasion wasn't so much a failure of foreign policy as it was a lack of faithfulness and trust in God. When God first calls Isaiah to prophesy, he responds with the same kind of insecurity, "Woe is me! I am lost, for I am a man of unclean lips, and I live among a people of unclean lips." Likewise, the apostle Paul shared a similar sentiment, "For I am the least of the apostles, unfit to be called an apostle, because I persecuted the church of God." How does God expect us to clean up this mess, when we're caught in the thick of it ourselves?

Simon Peter fell to his knees in front of Jesus; the miraculous catch of fish, juxtaposed next to his own deficient faith, overwhelmed him. He was not simply showing humility when he cried out, "Go away from me, Lord, for I am a sinful man!" He truly was insecure. Did he harbour some hidden guilt—sins that continued to nag at his conscience—for which he wasn't sure he would be forgiven? Like Isaiah and Paul, he too was afraid because of his deep flaws. Yet, in each instance, God filled them all with grace sufficient to plug up whatever holes were in their faith, so they could courageously overcome the obstacles in their way. Isaiah had his doubts cast out by a vision of holy angels who cleansed his lips with a burning coal so that he could cry out to God's invitation, "Here I am; send me!" Paul knew that his success as an apostle came from the grace of God, so that his hard work was not in vain. Simon Peter and the others walked away from their livelihood to follow Christ; they left boats and nets behind, because Jesus had shown them the abundance of God's grace. When our own insecurities lead us to tighten our grip on the things we hold dear, God's endless mercy stretches our vision beyond whatever stands in our way, so we ~Tom Bailev-Robertson, Pastoral Associate can overcome our fears and give to others courageously.


