January 13/14, 2018: 2nd Sunday in Ordinary Time

<u>Second Sunday in Ordinary Time</u>: 1 Samuel 3:3-10, 19; Psalm 40; 1 Corinthians 6:13-15, 17-20; John 1:35-42

Like all clichés, the admonition "be yourself" has a kind of timeless quality to it. It echoes in Polonius' advice to Laertes in Hamlet, "This above all: to thine own self be true" and in the ancient Greeks' aphorism, "Know thyself." We are often a mystery to ourselves, and in a cruel twist, the harder we try to be ourselves, the further we slip away from who we are. The mind is a bizarre relationship of one where the knower and the one known are the same. When the mind looks inwards, back on itself, it causes a split between the two. If a self is known, then it's an object. If a self is doing the knowing, then it is a subject. So when the mind (as subject) tries to know itself (as object), it stretches away from being known, like a dog chasing its tail. We're infused with a desire to be in relationship, yet trying to fill that desire on our own only drifts us further away from ourselves. incredibly lonely situation. Trying to be conscious of consciousness is like a camera trying to take a picture of itself. You can take a selfie, but can you take a selfie of your selfie? Getting that picture takes another camera.

The way out of this paradox is so startling and counter-intuitive that it must come to us by the light of faith. St. Paul captures it succinctly today in the words, "you are not your own." Put another way, you are not yourself. Our true identities, our authentic selves, rest in God, not in ourselves alone. Christ proclaimed the Reign of God, a state of being where relationships are completely rooted in truth and love. In heaven, the barriers to love—sin, death, deception, and greed—are torn down and dismantled. The citizens of God's Kingdom are perfectly themselves because they are united with Christ. In finding Christ, we find that elusive self we desire. The Church's Catechism puts it this way, "The elect live 'in Christ,' but they retain, or rather find, their true identity, their own name."

Christ's first disciples thought they were seeking someone to deliver them from Roman occupation, or perhaps someone to teach them spiritual insights. They didn't anticipate they would encounter God so directly in person. This encounter also revealed who they were and who they were called to become. We see this particularly in Peter's encounter with Christ. "You are Simon son of John," Jesus solemnly identified Peter by who he already was. Jesus already knew him. Then Christ revealed a new name, a new calling for Simon, "You are to be called Cephas." Aramaic name for rock translates to Peter. It became both a name and a title for Peter -Christ identified Peter by his earthly family and by his heavenly role as the Church's rock. We share Peter's fate. God hands us a name too. The city of God is built of many stones, each one with a name on it. There's a stone for each of us with our true identity written on it. When we encounter Christ, we catch a glimpse of that heavenly name in this life. Already God makes a home for the Holy Spirit in our hearts, so we are never alone. We are destined to be part of God's great temple, each of us a living stone in the eternal homeland. God knows us better than we know ourselves. ~Tom Bailey-Robertson


