

January 21/22, 2017: 3rd Sunday in Ordinary Time

Third Sunday in Ordinary Time: Isaiah 9:1-4, 1 Corinthians 1:10-13, 17-18; Matthew 4:12-23

One of the characteristics that distinguished early humans from their primate ancestors was the ability to plan ahead. Proto-humans cached supplies for later; their less sophisticated cousins did not. This talent comes with a price though—thinking ahead is both useful and stressful. The caution displayed in hiding supplies also suggests a level of pessimism about the future. It involves imaging a future where things might be worse than they are now. The fine line between thoughtful concern and neurosis can be drawn by the sleeplessness each induces. Asking yourself if you have enough life insurance coverage at 3 p.m. suggests prudence; lying awake with the same question at 3 a.m. conveys anxiety. Sometimes the unknowns in life stack up and weigh down on us until we feel we can't even breathe.

While our understanding of stress is thoroughly modern, the problem of worry is ancient. The fishers at the lakeside must have felt the same heavy feeling on their hearts after a bad catch as we feel when the furnace breaks the week after getting laid off. If things can get this bad this quickly, what else might happen? Perhaps Peter and Andrew spent sleepless nights worrying about their leaky boat and the precarious fish stock in the lake. To complicate their lives even further, Jesus shows up and tells them that the Kingdom of God is at hand. For the self-employed fisherfolk trying to make ends meet, the message to drop everything and follow might have sounded like another task to do between mending the nets and negotiating next month's fish quota. Worse yet, it may have struck them as an impossibility—like asking them to fish for moonbeams.

Discipleship can feel the same way to us: a burden we're too busy for, or a mission we'll never figure out how to accomplish. Nonetheless, Jesus didn't wait for the disciples retire from their jobs before calling them. He didn't announce that the Reign of God was something to be put off until you're ready. The good news Christ proclaimed is that the Kingdom of God is at hand—it's already here. It's not some future event to be planned for or worried about, it's a present reality that God calls us to enter into. Better still, Christ lights the way for us to enter the Kingdom of God today, so we can leave our anxiety about the future behind. Christ convinced those first disciples and they left their nets, their boats, and even their families—the sources of their worry melted away in light of the good news. We don't have to wait until we're perfectly ready to live our discipleship—Christ relieves us from the burden of anxiety so we have the freedom to follow him already.


