

Thirteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time: 2 Kings 4:8-12, 14-16; Psalm 89; Romans 6:3-4, 8-11; Matthew 10:37-42

Once I did some travelling through Europe with a friend. We stayed with his aunt and her husband in their London flat. They got a kick out of watching a couple of 18-year-old prairie boys try to tackle as much European culture as they could in 2 months. She gave some advice about dating: if I intended to impress a girl with my cooking, avoid making Spaghetti Bolognese; she'd sat through her fair share of uninspired third dates where meat sauce was on the menu. When the unnamed Shunammite woman in today's first reading shows Elisha such fantastic hospitality, my mind drifts back to the care my friend's aunt showed us, as well as her impeccable sense of taste. Beyond giving us accommodations, she embraced us as if we were her own sons. I imagine that's the kind of hospitality the Shunammite woman showed She appointed a small chamber for him and Elisha. equipped it with a bed, a chair, a table, and a lamp to make the room comfortable and welcoming. She made room in her home to host a perfect stranger as though Elisha was her own son.

Though she was wealthy, the woman from Shunem was not worry-free. Her husband was old and she had no son of her own. A lack of a male heir placed her household in a precarious position. Although she was portrayed as capable, resourceful, and perceptive, she was nonetheless vulnerable to her male-dominated culture. Perhaps it's this vulnerability that left her open to host Elisha and show him exquisite hospitality; she empathized with the travelling prophet and saw in him a spark of the divine. The elaborate welcome she unrolled from her bountiful means belied her insecure standing. In the Gospel today, Jesus tells his followers not to rely on the security of our family name to guarantee our place in the Kingdom of Heaven. He employs a shocking rhetorical flourish to get his point across—our ultimate concern is not our parents, our children, or even our own safety-God wants our total allegiance. The result of dedicating ourselves totally to God is not that we get to ignore everyone else, rather, it opens us to extend radical hospitality to our neighbours. God embraces us as His own daughters and sons, so we no longer restrict our generosity to our own kind, but open ourselves to welcome everyone as family.

When we were baptized—lowered into the waters of the font-we descended into the tomb with Christ and were joined to His death. We were lifted out of the water to unite with Christ in new life; our old life was left behind. Everything we need for eternal life has been won for us through Christ's death and resurrection, while the things that hold us back remain sunk in the waters of the font. The newly baptized are figuratively naked, vulnerable, with nothing to cling to but the Cross of Christ. Through baptism, we left behind our status, our sin, our family Visiting us today? Welcome! If you wish to name, our heritage, and our citizenship to this world. Least Coin Collection Update:

As was our plan, we continue to hold back 25% of the Least Coin Collection for the needs of our Refugee Family, the Oweida's. As they prepare for the birth of their fourth child next month, we will be using some of the funds to purchase a new crib, car seat and stroller. The other 75% of the collection will be disbursed to our works of charity. At the end of June, we donated a total of \$5000 to the following charities:

<u>Winnipeg Harvest</u> is a not-for-profit, community-based organization that is a food distribution & training centre. Their goals are to collect and share surplus food with people who are hungry and to offer training opportunities to help people step up and out of poverty. Their ultimate goal is to eliminate the need for food banks in our community. Our donation is earmarked for infant formula.

<u>Gonzaga Middle School of Winnipeg</u> empowers academically capable children from low-income families to develop to their full potential while accompanying them on their educational journey from middle school through high school and beyond. It supports students breaking the cycle of poverty by providing an enhanced, holistic, culturally-sensitive, Jesuit-inspired middle school education.

<u>Returning to Spirit</u> (RTS) is a non-profit organization born out of a partnership and vision between an Aboriginal man, a religious Sister and a talented design team to address the divisive legacy of Indian Residential Schools. Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal trainers form the heart of the organization, designing and delivering workshops that reconcile one's spirit and with the perceived "other," moving individuals, families, organizations and whole communities forward through the principles of personal empowerment and community leadership.

Assiniboia Residential School Reunion: Assiniboia Residential School was a Residential high school on Academy Rd. that ran from c.1958-1972. A reunion for alumni was held on June 23rd and 24th. In a gesture of reconciliation, St. John Brebeuf and other Parishes around the South Winnipeg Deanery helped sponsor the reunion dinner for alumni and survivors.

<u>The Salvation Army</u> is passionately committed to eradicating poverty and caring for people who are struggling. The Salvation Army is working to address the dehumanizing scourge of poverty and injustice and educate the public about what it means to live in poverty, offering practical assistance for children and families, often tending to the basic necessities of life, providing shelter for homeless people and rehabilitation for people who have lost control of their lives to an addiction.

<u>House of Hesed</u> provides a home for persons living with HIV/AIDS, sharing mercy, hope, dignity, and peace. Consistent with the Christian perspective of caring for those in need regardless of race, creed, gender, or sexual orientation, they provide a home-like setting promoting the physical, emotional, social and spiritual quality of life of persons affected by HIV.

<u>Palliative Manitoba</u> provides programs, services, education and information to individuals, families and caregivers in an effort to lessen the inevitable stress during life's final journey. Their programs and services are aimed at supporting individuals and their families; first as a resource when they are learning about palliative care, next as they move through their palliative journey to their loved ones final days and final hours, then continuing through the grief process.


