
Least Coin Collection:

Isaiah 66:10-14; Psalm 66; Galatians 6:14-18; Luke 10:1-12,17-20 Humans, all of us, can be very contradictory creatures. Think, for example, of all the times we have a very clear and accurate notion of what's required for our welfare and still fail to make that choice. This brings to mind the old joke: God must have a flat forehead from all the times God smacks hand against brow in frustration over our inconsistencies.

Communication is something essential to our welfare. Advertisers know this and have many variations on the theme "reach out and touch someone." Yet how many times do we choose not to communicate, to withdraw in silent isolation? Today's readings are about communicating God's Word, a mission that is shared by all of us who have been gifted with faith.

The author of Third Isaiah (Chapters 56-66) brings a message of hope. Jerusalem is a nursing mother: "That you may nurse and be satisfied from her consoling breast" (Isaiah 66:11). The Lord, our God is a loving mother: "As a mother comforts her child, so will I comfort you" (66:13). For this prophet, God is compelled to reach out.

Paul speaks today in Galatians about "brand marks." In Paul's time, brand marks showed that a person belonged to someone else. Circumcision was this kind of mark for the followers of the Jewish law. The Christian sign of belonging and commitment is the cross. Life has meaning in Jesus' cross and the new life brought about by Jesus' death and resurrection (Galatians 6:15; 2 Corinthians 5:17). This cross bridges our communication, vertically God and horizontally with one another.

Luke is the only evangelist who speaks about a mission of the seventy-two. Matthew, Mark, and John all have a mission of the Twelve. Luke is anticipating the proclamation of the Good News to the Gentiles. The disciples speak the ultimate message of the Lord, "Say to them, `The kingdom of God has come near to you' " (Luke 10:9). We are today's disciples. Our mandate is the same -- to speak by our words and deeds the love of our God.

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Fifteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time:

Deuteronomy 30:10-14; Psalm 69; Colossians 1:15-20; Luke 10:25-37

Unconditional love is an other-worldly ideal. Forces here on earth limit our generosity. Business teaches us debits and credits, law enacts statutes of limitation, athletics value strictly enforced rules of the game. No wonder we struggle to accept the reality of a God infinite in mercy and compassion.

Deuteronomy talks today about the people of Israel who have suffered a curse rather than blessing because of their violations of the covenant. The author, however, is unequivocal in reminding the wayward that God's capacity for forgiveness cannot be exhausted. The Lord, our God's arms are outstretched to those seeking forgiveness; God requires only the resolution to try again.

Paul, in our passage from Colossians, is making a point: God restored harmony to the universe through the action of Christ. In Christ, God has destroyed all those barriers that keep humans from God, from the created world, and from themselves. Unity is the result of Christ's act of reconciliation. The price of this compassion is high: "Making peace through the blood of his cross" (Colossians 1:20; also Romans 5:9-11; Ephesians 2:13-18).

Luke, as opposed to Matthew and Mark, has the lawyer speak the great law of love for God and neighbor. The lawyer asks: "And who is my neighbor?" (Luke 10:29). The evangelist wants to teach us that all who show mercy are able to belong to God's family.

The parable illustrates this teaching. The legalism of the society prescribed a ritual impurity for anyone touching the corpse of a Jewish traveler. Thus the priest and the Levite passed by the man victimized by robbers. The Samaritan becomes the unlikely hero. As a non-Jew he is an outcast or a "non-neighbor," yet he alone opts for the higher law of compassion. He is a hero because he is a genuine neighbor.

What kind of neighbors are we? If the measure is "How far do I have to go?" then ours is a this-world compassion. If the measure is "What more can I do, especially for the poor and abandoned?" then ours is an other-worldly and Godlike mercy.

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The Art of Rasen Haddad:

Rasen Haddad is an Iraqi refugee from Qaraqosh now living in Jordan. He is an artist/art teacher who studied at Mosul University. His art, created mostly with pens



because of the difficulty of obtaining oil or acrylic colours, is currently on display in our main church entrance. His work depicts the three parts of his story– before, during and after the crisis. Haddad left Iraq in 2013 and fled to Jordan with his wife, Shahad. They will be relocating to their new home in Melbourne, Australia later this month.
