June 17/18, 2017: Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ

Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ: Deuteronomy 8:2-3, 14-16; Psalm 147;

1 Corinthians 10:16-17; John 6:51-59

At the heart of any culture are the staple foods that make up its distinct culinary identity. Staple foods are first and foremost local, readily available, everyday ingredients that tell the story of land. With fish and chips, we see earthy potato flesh joined with the buoyant flakiness of fish; such a dish calls to mind a hearty seaside place whose simplicity belies its rich texture. The people's story comes through in the way the food is served and prepared. It's no surprise that the elegance of a food like sushi comes from the same culture that has a word for the disciplined art of arranging flowers (ikebana). Spaghetti and meatballs, beer and pizza, falafel and pita, rice and beans, cheeseburger and fries-some foods belong together, and when we eat them, we participate in the story that they tell. When God feeds us, the way God does it communicates something to us. Of all the food combinations that Christ could have chosen to be His Body and Blood, what story was He conveying to us by choosing bread and wine?

Bread is a voluminous food, both in its substance and in its effect on our bodies. Too much bread fills us up and makes us grow, as though the leavening property of the dough both raises the bread and pumps us out too. Bread makes for a fitting symbol of a body, especially one that is meant to be substantial, generous, and abundant. Bread is baked as a loaf, which is usually too big to eat as a single serving. So, bread is meant to be shared. A healthy-sized pumpernickel brings to mind a party setting—maybe it's been hollowed out to make room for spinach dip—rather than a lonely meal eaten from the microwave. So, when we gather together to celebrate Eucharist, God calls us together to feed us as a people, then sends us out to share what we've received with the rest of the world. Eucharist is bread to be broken and shared, not a Hot Pocket to be eaten alone in front of the TV.

In Jesus' day, blood was representative of a creature's spirit. The blood of kosher animals was not to be consumed, but poured out on the ground, "for the blood is the life, and you shall not eat the life with the flesh" (Deuteronomy 12:23). So for Jesus to invite His followers not only to eat His flesh, but to consume His blood as well, it would have had a very specific meaning--He was asking them to partake of His very life, "so whoever eats me will live because of me." Wine raises our spirits and amplifies the life within us. Like bread, too much wine can make us sick. So there are customs governing the drinking of wine. Like bread, wine is meant to be shared in the company of others, not in rushed nips straight from the bottle. We clink glasses of wine as a symbol of sharing drink from the same cup to celebrate life, good health, and happiness. While it may seem bawdy to associate Eucharist with the practice of toasting, we are in fact celebrating a spiritual Communion together, one that flows from Christ's very life. In the Eucharist, God feeds us with Christ, so the very life of God might abide in us. In the Eucharist, we find a bond of friendship with God and with one another.

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




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
