June 21/22, 2014: Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ

<u>The Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ (Corpus Christi):</u> Deuteronomy 8:2-3, 14-16; Psalm 147; 1 Cor 10:16-17; John 6:51-59

Suffering is a mysterious part of life. There's no escape from suffering, it's comes with being a human and being a body. Bodies are susceptible to illness and injury. Bodies are acted on by outside forces. Bodies can be shot, crushed, starved, and killed. As if to add insult to injury, these vulnerable bodies are also souls who aspire to be like God: free from harm and worry, whole and complete, nourished and fulfilled, and never knowing death. At the heart of our humanity is a stunning contradiction between promise and reality: we have a craving for eternity, yet are stuck wandering in uncertainty.

The ancient Israelites experienced opposition in the desert, what the first reading calls "the long way". Along that "long way" they went through hunger and thirst, dodged fiery serpents, and survived on strange foods. They weren't lost though; they were led there. God supplied them with heavenly food to lead them through the long way. For the Israelites, this experience would shape their understanding of their relationship with God for generations. Living through hardship was not the result of being cut off from God, but a struggle that was won or lost with God at their side. The suffering part still hurt just as much. Instead of it being experienced as divine punishment, it was seen as a test to endure.

Feeling that God tests us still doesn't collapse the mystery of suffering. Job starts off being tested by God, but his friends all try to explain away his suffering. Job finally asks God "why" and God's answer back is a resounding "who are you to ask?" That God sounds snarky is a bit of biblical humor, but it holds some profound wisdom too. Suffering raises that question once again of who we truly are. Testing is just a way to get at the truth; sometimes suffering can feel like a test to bring out our true selves. "When the chips are down…" is when we find out who we really are. There is nothing else to point to that can explain who we are, other than ourselves. "Sure, Job is faithful," says the Satan, "but take away his family, fortune, and friends, then see we'll see what he's really like." There's only one way to find out.

Likewise, Jesus has nothing outside himself to account for his faithfulness. All he has is his very self, his body and his blood, and he gives it willingly. Jesus takes the long way, which for him leads to Jerusalem, the cross, and the tomb. Yet, taking this path reveals his true self to his followers: in his very flesh and blood is the true food from heaven. Once again God supplies us with bread for the long way, so we can get through it. ~Tom Bailey-Robertson, Pastoral Associate

On Mealtime as Prayer:

Eating together as family, with friends or in community is as old a human expression as history can recall. The very word "companion" means "the one you share your bread with." Sharing food is just as nourishing to the soul as eating is nourishing for the body. How is it that in recent years the family meal has suffered such disintegration? All day we graze and nibble and by dinner time, we are no longer hungry. We are so busy, that we cannot cook, or cannot sit together over food and drink to share the events of the day and the issues that burn in our hearts. The average American family eats dinner in about five minutes!

Beyond the meal shared which we call the "last supper," we hear that the risen Jesus shared his bread at the end of a long walk with his grieving disciples on the road to Emmaus. He broke bread with them and "they knew him in the breaking of the bread." Every meal that we share is an occasion to "know him"—to recognize Christ in the heart of the persons with whom we share our meal. We also hear the story of a fish fry that the risen Jesus prepared for his friends after a night of fishing. How concrete. How physical. How human. How loving. Ghosts don't cook for us. But the bodily presence of a risen Lord knows our bodily hungers and provides for us in material ways. To share what we have with another is to "know him." To break bread with a blessing is to help us remember that every meal looks concretely to the meal. And it isn't possible to comprehend the eucharistic meal if we don't understand the sacramentality of the daily meal.

Collect blessings for your table. Offer a variety of words and songs so that your prayers do not become routine or unimaginative. Take time to enjoy your meal and to enjoy one another. If you live alone, invite others in to share your bread.
