From Father Mark:



June 24/25, 2017: 12th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Twelfth Sunday in Ordinary Time: Jeremiah 20:10-13; Psalm 69; Romans 5:12-15; Matthew 10:26-33

There are many factors that make up a person's identity. We are known by our family and our ancestry. The land where we dwell also shapes us and gives us a sense of ourselves. Furthermore, we make our accomplishments a part of our persona. The endeavours we choose to pour our effort into wind up reflecting something of who we are: builders, scholars, gardeners, healers, pilots, writers, farmers, teachers, advocates, and athletes. There's an almost endless list of roles to occupy, but each of us only has a finite amount of effort to spend. Whether we practice these roles as professionals or as hobbyists, our passions make us unique. We take on some aspect of each role we practice. How we choose to align ourselves reveals something of who we are. Even our failures are helpful-they refine our ideas about ourselves and expose where we have room to grow.

This process is downright terrifying. There's great freedom in choosing our pursuits, but we might rather exchange self-determination for security. In the Book of Exodus, the Hebrew people found their new freedom to be daunting, so they longed to return to their slavery in Egypt. Facing the potential to choose for ourselves gives rise to the anxiety that we might choose poorly, or that the person we reveal ourselves to be proves to be inadequate or deficient in some way. The first sin depicted in Genesis came about in part from such insecurity-the first humans attempted to make themselves equal to God, as though who they were created to be was not enough. Both the Hebrews and the first humans felt adrift, like they were wandering lost in the desert, when in reality God was leading them to discover their true selves.

Our own self-doubt can overwhelm us at times. Yet Jesus says in the Gospel that nothing hidden will remain secret-the Lord uncovers our souls and gives rise to our deepest desires. We, in turn, commit our causes to God. The truth of our being, our real identity, lies with God. Any tests or trials that reveal more of who we are need not be experienced as punishment, but as a part of the divine process of uncovering ourselves in the light of God. Whoever we are, we commit to God our achievements and our failings, our strengths and our weaknesses, our passions and our faults-whatever is buried deep within us, God will bring to light. Christ says he will acknowledge us before God-I think this means recognizing us for who we are. It sounds like a joyful discovery of our commitments and our passions before the One who placed those things in our hearts to begin with.
