

March 18/19, 2017: 3rd Sunday of Lent

Third Sunday in Lent: Exodus 17:3-7; Romans 5:1-2, 5-8; John 4:5-42

Living in peace takes a lot of effort. From the everyday interactions at home with our families and at work, to the highest levels of relations between countries, true peace is not the status quo, but an ideal that we constantly strive towards. Humans have differences and these differences give rise to conflict; we seem to have an endless supply of both on our hands. One way to deal with conflict is to hole ourselves up away from those who are dissimilar from us. Some countries choose to close their borders to strangers in the name of putting their homeland first. We can do the same thing when we choose to overlook our neighbours in need. Another way to cope with difference is to escalate the conflict into a fight, to justify attacking another over a point of contention. War is not so much an act of aggression as it is a failure of imagination—violence results from a dearth of better options. The way of peace envisions a path through differences towards reconciliation; the way of war only sees a future through eliminating the other. Yet, to remain passive in the face of conflict can be just as pernicious as picking a fight. Acquiescing to the demands conflict places on us; this removes our sense of self and sacrifices agency for the sake of getting along. It's just another way of avoiding conflict, but it doesn't lead to lasting peace. True peace does not mean abandoning your values for the sake of smoothing over differences. What does it take to really live in peace?

The woman at the well found all kinds of differences between herself and Jesus. She points out that Jesus is a Jew, so it is improper for him to address her, a Samaritan. Jesus promises her living water; she tells him that he is missing a bucket to draw from the well. He shows some insight into her relationships with men, so she raises the difference in worship between Samaritans and Jews. Jesus does not dismiss any of the differences she raises; he does, however, look beyond their differences to speak to her spirit. He rallies her faith so that she is able to see past their differences—she comes to know and believe who he is. When conflict in our lives threatens to raise our differences into an impasse, God rouses up the faith we need to envision a way to peace. Without faith, differences loom large in our field of view and block the way forward. The ultimate conflict is sin: it raises differences between us and God. Yet, Christ was willing to die for us while sin still separated us from God. The gift of the cross is the faith it gives us, to see past our sin to the peaceable Kingdom of God. God pours the faith we need into our hearts through the Holy Spirit, so we can dare to hope for true peace in our lives.
