

Fifth Sunday of Lent: (3rd Scrutiny): Ezekiel 32:12-14; Romans 8:8-11; John 11:1-45

For the last three weeks, our readings have come from a cycle in Christian Initiation known as the Scrutinies. This week, Jesus raises Lazarus from the dead, leading many to believe in him. All of us, along with our catechumens and candidates, prepare to enter the mystery of Christ's passion next week.

Raising Lazarus was the tipping point in Jesus' ministry-he could no longer walk openly among the people, for the council of priests and Pharisees issued orders for his arrest. From that point on, Jesus' impending death increasingly figures into the events of John's Gospel. Mary anoints Jesus, prefiguring his burial anointing; Jesus speaks openly about his death, foretelling his betrayal and Peter's denial; he prepares his disciples for his departure and for the coming of the Holy Spirit. As we near the threshold of Holy Week, the tension begins to build. Lent can't go on forever, though we might wish it could just to avoid the trauma of Christ's passion. Raising Lazarus is the last time Jesus will act so effectively and dramatically until his own resurrection.

Lent can become comfortable because it focuses on our own agency—on our own participation in God's Kingdom, here and now. The onus is on us to pray, to fast, and to give alms in order to strengthen our faith. The transition to Holy Week is jarring because, like Jesus, we shift from activity to passion; from acting to being acted upon. On the way to our infinite and almighty God, we must face up to the reality of human limitation. Our work and achievements do not solely form the meaning of our lives-those times when we suffer shape us as well. Suffering is not simply physical pain, but periods of inactivity: unemployment, failure, addiction, or illness. We need to share stories of suffering-not to induce pity, but to see suffering by the light of day, to respond to it, and to look for God's response too.

We have a cultural aversion to suffering. This might move us to alleviate it, but more often than not we end up trying to avoid it. Ask most people what kind of death they would desire, most would understandably wish for a quick and painless end. We admire stories of people overcoming their limitations, not succumbing to them. So, it is odd for us to see Jesus wait for two days upon hearing that his good friend Lazarus is sick. Jesus stands by, inactive, while his friends suffer. That pause opens up the possibility for God to act in extraordinary ways. This is not to advocate delay in seeking medical attention when it is needed! Rather, it is to show that the times we would sooner forget, times when we are being acted upon rather than acting as agents of our own destiny, are sacred moments open for God to act. Christ's passion lends dignity to our own suffering. Where we might rather keep suffering sealed away, God rolls away the stone, unwraps the bindings, and brings our suffering out into the daylight. Suffering is not meant to be hidden in the dark, ignored, buried, but looked at through the light of Christ's own life, passion, death, and resurrection.
