March 8/9, 2014: 1st Sunday of Lent

1st Sunday of Lent: Genesis 2:7-9,16-18,25; 3:1-7; Psalm 51; Romans 5:12-19; Matthew 4:1-11

Jesus was hungry, and not just 3-p.m.-scour-the-office-for-cookies-hungry; he was bone-weary, worn out, and depleted. The physical sensation of hunger had long ago been replaced by a spiritual emptiness that had him questioning his whole existence. The voice at his baptism calling him God's beloved, the drive of the spirit pushing him out into the desert: had it all been real? Maybe his friends back home were right, that he was getting caught up in delusions of grandeur. Could it be better to forget the whole thing and move on?

After all, life since that day in the river hadn't been easy. No endorsement deals floated his way to help him put food on the table. It's not as though camel dealerships were offering to pay him for appearances, nor were toga designers asking him to lend his name to their latest collection. If he really were God's Son, shouldn't he be able to command these rocks into bread to fend off starvation?

Suddenly a scene from scripture popped into his head: his Hebrew ancestors were hungry in the desert too, until God fed them with manna. The Israelites had been tempted to hoard the heavenly bread which appeared each morning like dew. They were only allowed to gather enough manna for the day, but, like children testing a parent's command, they tried collecting more. Their reasoning was sound: they could sleep better at night, secure in knowing they had the bread they needed for tomorrow. By morning though, the hoarded manna went foul and bred worms. They had to learn to trust that God keeps promises. The bread filled their bellies, but it would be God's word that filled their lives. God had not promised them security, but instead breathed life into them that would last through any trial.

Hunger in the desert drove the Israelites to wish they had never left Egypt—they longed for the food that sustained them during their slavery. God had in mind a life for them beyond mere existence as slaves: a life freely and fully alive. A peace fell over Jesus as he imagined what this gift of life might mean for him, God's beloved. Like the Israelites, he too could depend on God's promise to fill him with life.

From Father Mark: It is always very interesting to listen to what people are giving up for Lent. For many years I have tried to get my heart and my faith around the eternal effects of chocolate, or soda, or even movies, and I must admit that it's really a stretch for me. The Church's call for people of good will to sacrifice for these forty days is meant to put us on the right track, yet we can sometimes look for the legal interpretations of how we can fulfill the call and yet not be too inconvenienced. I hesitate to offer too many suggestions about Lenten sacrifice, because we have a strong sense that, "no one's going to tell me what to do for Lent." Indeed, our Lenten sacrifice is a personal choice that we each must make.

In Mark's Gospel, Jesus encounters a rich man who asks Jesus what he must do to inherit eternal life. Pope Francis recently preached on this reading. He said, "He (the rich man) was a good man, a man who had observed the commandments from his youth, but this was not enough for him, he wanted more. The Holy Spirit was pushing him further". So, Jesus offers him more than keeping the law. Jesus looked at him, loved him and said to him: 'Go, sell what you have, and give to the poor; then come, follow me'. At that statement, his face fell, and he went away sad, for he had many possessions. The man's heart was full from his wealth. There was no room in his heart to follow Jesus; he was unable to make that choice freely. "In the end," said the Pope, "the money chose for him."

Lent is a time to live free of the constraints that hold us back from following Christ. This might be our material things, it might be an unhealthy attitude we cling to, or it might be a sense of worthlessness that questions our value before God. Many things vie for room in our hearts and threaten to choose for us. Whatever we struggle with, Jesus looks at us, loves us, and encourages us to push through our bonds. It takes a little imagination and faith to see the ways that God is calling us to greater freedom. I know that all too often we shy away from God's urging us forward. I pray daily for wisdom, I pray daily for fortitude and I pray daily that I can put aside my ego and listen to the voice of the Holy Spirit speaking through the people I serve. Sometimes that means looking, loving, and pushing you to go further.

After all, with Christ on our side, what could possibly stand in our way this Lent?


