

October 31/November 1, 2015: Solemnity of All Saints

Solemnity of All Saints: Revelation 7:2-4, 9-14; 1 John 3:1-3; Matthew 5:1-12a

Being a saint is a rough gig—God has asked saints to do some tough jobs over the years. Usually these jobs entailed facing lots of opposition and some long odds, often leading to a painful death. Only prophets could rival saints for their ability to garner abuse. That's why Jonah had enough sense to run from God when he was called to be a prophet. He knew what manner of treatment was in store for him: beatings, public ridicule, lock up in jail or worse, a cistern. Saint or prophet, getting the call from God meant embarking on a dangerous ride marked by persecution, but not without meaning.

The beatitudes are borne amidst this kind of meaningful suffering: spiritual poverty arises out of lack or scarcity; mourning comes from loss; meekness requires restraint of one's powers; hunger for righteousness results from injustice; mercy from encountering need; purity in heart is produced from fighting temptation; peacemaking means enduring conflict; undergoing persecution for righteousness' and Christ's sake means suffering the penalty for the sins of others. None of these circumstances are desirable, but Jesus dares to call those who endure them blessed. We all hope to live happy lives free from want, fear, hate, and suffering, and yet, without exception, we are all susceptible. Not one of us can escape our own neediness any more than we can avoid temptation, conflict, or loss; though not for lack of trying.

The biggest sins are often products of trying to avoid suffering. In the face of scarcity, we sin when we turn to greed, hoarding for ourselves what ought to be generously shared. When tempted, we sin when we embrace the distraction, even becoming hostile and lying to cover up our indulgence. Conflicts naturally arise in any relationship, but we sin when we dwell on the wrongdoing and cling to the offense, fueling our anger and stifling mercy. When unsatisfied with our own lives, we sin when we fall into envy and miss the joy of celebrating the good in others. Above all else, we sin when we face our suffering alone, as though our suffering were somehow beyond God's help. In seeking a way out of our situation on our own, and we sin. In this way, sin is understandable—sin presents itself as an escape from suffering, when it is really a trap that leads to more agony.

It is for this reason that the mission of the Church is to rescue everybody from the trap of sin. We all approach God's altar as sinners in need of help, in need of a way out of our suffering. God blesses us so we can face our afflictions with Christ, instead of going it alone. The saints are those blessed by God so they might show us what Christ suffering with us looks like. Christ mourns with us when we suffer loss. Christ builds peace with us when we face conflict. Christ hungers for righteousness with us when we endure injustice. Christ looks only to God when we are tempted together. God blesses us with the faith that Christ stands with us no matter what we face, so we can love courageously. ~Tom Bailey-Robertson, Pastoral Associate
