

Thirty-Third Sunday in Ordinary Time: Daniel 12:1-3; Psalm 16; Hebrews 10:11-14, 18; Mark 13:24-32

The Last Battle, the final entry in the C.S. Lewis' Chronicles of Narnia, depicts the end of the Narnian world in a type of reverse creation: the sea rises to cover the earth; the stars fall out of the sky; the sun and moon are extinguished. There is a scene of judgment where the faithful characters are led into the true Narnia. The end of Narnia turns out to be the beginning of a new story, "which goes on forever, and in which every chapter is better than the one before."

These final weeks before the end of the Liturgical year reflect on endings—we celebrate the lives of Saints and we remember our loved ones who have died. Outside we see signs of nature slowing down, preparing for the long sleep of winter. Even the sun seems to be settling down. The season certainly matches our Gospel reading, where Jesus paints a picture for his disciples of a coming ending. Though the stars crash from the darkened sky, the Son of Man appears visibly and gathers God's people to himself. Christ's light always shines brightest in the darkness, so we can find our way home.

On Tuesday at the national conference of the Italian church, Pope Francis said about the Church, "We are not living an era of change but a change of era." It sounds like he has been taking Jesus' words on end times to heart. Sometimes it feels like the sky is falling down around us. The headlines are fraught with warnings about climate change, economic collapse, growing disparity between wealthy and poor people, terrorist threats, and social instability. Sometimes we are able to insulate ourselves from the signs of the times and pretend that we can get away with running things as we always have. As our government makes preparations to bring a large influx of Syrian refugees to Canada, the reality of the crisis will be harder to ignore. Soon, our neighbours may very well be newcomers who have fled their own times of anguish in hope of starting a new chapter to their story. Will we make room in our lives to share what we have? Will we dare to let their story become ours as well? Jesus points out the fig tree and notes that its branches become tender before they spring into summer shoots. If we hope to grow, to thrive, during the changing times, the Church, the Body of Christ, must be tender as well-vulnerable even in the midst of an uncertain future. We see the light of Christ shining the way even through the darkest times and we know that the beginning of a better season is right around the corner. ~Tom Bailey-Robertson, Pastoral Associate
