November 19/20, 2016: Solemnity of Christ the King

Christ the King: 2 Samuel 5:1-3: Colossians 1:12-20: Luke 23:35-43

There's a haunting line in today's Gospel. Jesus is hanging on the cross, while leaders and soldiers surround him and deride him. There are also bystanders who do nothing but take in the scene before them. "And the people stood by, watching." It's chilling to imagine watching Jesus' crucifixion, but even more so to think of others standing idle, perhaps too indifferent or too afraid to act. What did the people see as they stood by? Jesus was not a stranger to them. He had a reputation as one who had saved others; even the Roman soldiers knew about him. Jesus had walked among them, healed their sick loved ones, shared openly with them his message of God's forgiveness, and he had taught them to love their neighbours. He had also warned them that he would be put to death because of this and that they too would face persecution because of him. Now the people watched as his words became reality. Could they go on living the way Jesus had lived if this was the result? For the moment, all they could do was stand and watch.

The cross is also a throne. It's a deep mystery of our faith that God saw fit to use an instrument of suffering to inaugurate the Reign of Christ. From the cross, Christ unfolds before us the Kingdom of Heaven, so that all might enter it. Now every instance of suffering in the world proclaims God's reign. Every illness, every death, every time someone is victimized, every time a crowd watches passively while an innocent person is persecuted—now each of these crosses are placed in the outstretched hands of the Lord. How we might wish it weren't so! Even when we are full of faith, when we have to suffer, or—even more—when we have to watch a loved one suffer, we wish for something else. We'll follow you anywhere Lord, just not to the cross. Peter couldn't take it either; despite his promise to follow Jesus to prison, even to death, he denied Jesus. Why couldn't Jesus come down from the cross and do away with suffering once and for all?

Instead, the day will come for each of us when we will watch another suffer. We might be sitting at the bedside of a dying loved one, perhaps we will be kneeling at the site of an accident, or maybe we will be standing in the kitchen listening to the devastating news: it was an overdose; I'm being laid off; I have cancer; I'm leaving you; there was nothing anyone could have done. We might look up at the crucifix hanging over the kitchen window and think. "You get down from there and do something!" The Kingdom of Heaven looks pretty weak from foot of the cross. However, on that day, not everyone will be watching from the sidelines. Just as it was at the Crucifixion, another person was there, hanging, and this man looked at Jesus face-to-face. From the ground, Jesus looked helpless, but no one saw what this man saw: Jesus' hand reaching out toward him, just as his own hand stretched out back to Jesus. When we suffer, Christ looks at us eye-to-eye. He will unfold before us the Kingdom of Heaven and we will follow.
