October 15/16, 2016: 29th Sunday in Ordinary Time

29th Sunday in Ordinary Time: Exodus 17:8-13; Psalm 121; 2 Timothy 3:14-4:2; Luke 18:1-8

In 1995, Quebec held a referendum vote to separate from Canada, but I stopped them. As I watched the vote on TV, I prayed that Quebec would stay (My school was French Immersion-maybe I thought I'd be deported if Quebec left). So long as I knelt in front of the coffee table with my face buried in my clasped hands, the "no" side would win. Every time I stopped praying, it seemed like the separatists started to gain votes, so I went back to praying. It felt like I did that for hours. Even though my back hurt and my face was hot, I stuck it out. So today Quebec is still a part of Canada thanks to the prayers of 10-year-old me.

Does prayer actually work this way? In today's first reading it seems to. Moses prayed as the Israelites fought with some nomads on their way out of Egypt. Whenever he bent his hand a certain way in the air, the Israelites started winning the battle; whenever his hand dropped, they began to falter. When Moses got tired, they simply propped up his hands.

In the Gospel, Jesus appears to suggest that if we keep pestering God, we'll eventually get what we want. He tells his disciples a story about a widow seeking after a ruling from a pompous, cranky, and unfair judge. At first he refuses to help her, but she persists and he eventually capitulates. When we hear parables with a king or a judge, we usually swap God into those roles, but that can't be the case with this character. What are we missing here?

Jesus clarifies by telling us outright to listen to the unjust judge, who basically says, "I will do the right thing, for the wrong reasons." It's right for a judge to grant justice; it's wrong to do so simply because he's annoyed. God can work with that. Justice gets done, even though the judge's motives are questionable. Jesus is telling us to pray always, even if our motives aren't perfect. The act of prayer itself shows that God is in control. Even if we set out to sway God to our will, prayer is the only action that is the antidote to this attitude. So we can pray always, even if our reasons are wrong. Ask God to pay back the people who hurt you, make you rich, or give you a promotion. Better we should leave God in charge of things like revenge and honour than for us to seek after them ourselves.
