Twenty-eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time:

2 Kings 5:14-17; 2 Timothy 2:8-13; Luke 17:11-19

Boundaries are a necessary part of any professional relationship, especially where there are disparities of power between the client and the professional. Is it appropriate for a therapist to receive gifts from her client? On the one hand, accepting gifts might influence objectivity in a caregiver, perhaps hurting the client in the long run. On the other hand, accepting gifts might build trust between the client and the caregiver, perhaps leading to greater quality of care. Whatever the policy might be in a given environment, all circumstances demand that caregivers put the wellbeing of their clients ahead of their own. Gratitude is appreciated, but shouldn't be expected from clients. The helper is, after all, just doing her job.

The prophet Elisha in today's first reading turns down the gift from Naaman the Syrian, whom he cured of his leprosy. Elisha made it clear that he serves the Lord, not Naaman. Jesus has a different attitude. Perhaps Jesus would have made a lousy therapist—he seemed to expect thanks and praise from the ten people he cured of their leprosy. This reveals the kind of relationship God has with us: it's not one of a client and a helper, but of creature and Creator. There can be no boundary between creature and Creator: there is nothing we can withhold from God as "our business." God chooses us to be his own, and this choice underpins the very reality of our lives. Simply by keeping us in mind, God keeps our existence going, and God promises to never forget us. Even though we might forget God, Christ reveals that God will never abandon us.

We can't say God needs our praise, but there's something about giving thanks that pleases God. Being thankful brings us closer to who God is. In other words, showing gratitude changes who we are. Thankfulness makes us more like the way God intends us to be—it makes us more like Christ. It's no accident, then, that the pinnacle of our identity is found in the Eucharist. The word "Eucharist" means *thanksgiving*, and we are a Eucharistic people. When we gather to celebrate Eucharist together, we ourselves are transformed into that which we proclaim. The Communion hymn *Gather in your Name* says it best, "Become what you receive!"

Ten people were healed, but only one was made whole; that is, only one was restored to the fullness of his identity as a creature of God. Giving thanks brought the healed man that much closer to God. Jesus noticed that the man was a Samaritan, an outsider to Jews. We, too, can live as people of gratitude, not because we belong to the right crowd, but because God always remembers us.

An Invitation to "Listening sessions" in preparation for the Archdiocese of Winnipeg Synod

At Pentecost, Archbishop Gagnon announced that our first Archdiocesan Synod will take place in stages over the next two years, 2016-2018. From September to November we enter the preparatory phase of the Synod, called "Listening Sessions", gatherings where people are invited to voice their views about present needs and future directions for the Church in the Archdiocese of Winnipeg.

"Listening" is the key word for these sessions. Archbishop Gagnon will be present at all sessions to hear the hopes and ideas of those present. It is also an occasion for all of us, not only to share our thoughts, but also to listen to one another and, in so doing, grow in unity and understanding as a community. Finally, in listening to one another, we seek to listen for where and how the Holy Spirit is leading our Church.

"Listening Sessions" have been scheduled throughout the Archdiocese; one for each of the six deaneries.

The format of these meetings is quite simple. Participants will be invited to respond to 3 general questions:

- 1. What do you appreciate most about the Church in the Archdiocese of Winnipeg; especially those things that help you grow in your faith and as a disciple of the Lord?
- 2. Where are we going? What is your vision for the Archdiocese for the coming years?
- 3. What is our responsibility? What do you see as the 3 priority areas that the Archdiocese should focus on? What would you like to accomplish in these areas?

No special knowledge or training is required, only an honest sharing of how you see things and a readiness to listen to others. Participants can respond either verbally or in written form. A written record will be kept of these responses which will guide the subsequent phases of the Synod process.

Everyone in the Archdiocese is invited to attend the listening sessions.
