September 24/25, 2016: 26th Sunday in Ordinary Time

26th Sunday in Ordinary Time: Amos 6:1, 4-7; 1 Timothy 6:11-16; Luke 16:19-31

While the rich man and Lazarus were still alive, all that separated them was a gate. A door, a passage, an entryway—whatever you might call the gate, it was surely crossable. Though hungry Lazarus ached for food, the rich man never bothered to open the door between them. A tragic status quo emerged: one man had more than enough, and another too little. It would have taken little to improve Lazarus' condition, one small gesture of kindness could have changed his life. However, years of inaction had built up a momentum of its own, so that to even crack open the door seemed impossible. Perhaps that ancient gate had blended in with the vine-covered walls and had faded into the background. Maybe the rich man was afraid of what lay behind the gate. When he heard Lazarus cry out, did the rich man imagine a desperate criminal stalking around in the night? Best to keep the doors sealed tight, he thought.

After they each died, the rich man discovered that the division he had let stand between himself and Lazarus was now fixed in place. However, now he was on the side of torment and Lazarus was in paradise. Where there was once a gate, now there was an impassable chasm. In a *Twilight Zone* sort of way, the rich man got what he wanted. He lived his life as though the poor man had been inaccessible—in death, his wish became permanently entrenched. Not wanting his brothers to follow his fate, the rich man asks Abraham to send Lazarus to warn his family. Abraham dismisses the idea, arguing that for those who see barriers where there are gates, surely they will not believe that someone might bridge the gap between life and death, let alone cross the division between rich and poor.

This is an uncomfortable story. Where we might hope to see the rich man undergo a conversion after experiencing God's abundant mercy, instead both the man and Abraham come across as stingy. The story served as a warning to the Pharisees, especially for those who loved money, but it also points to what Christ accomplished in his death and resurrection. Through Christ, God traverses the impasse between life and death. Christ pries open the sealed door that separates the living from the dead. We pin our hope for everlasting life on this—we too will follow Christ through that breach in the death's door. Yet the time to follow Christ is not after we have died, but today in the life we have now. The passage open before us is not only the portal between life and death, but through all the barriers we might perceive. If Christ can forge a way from death to life, surely we can follow Him past the walls we think exist between our sisters and brothers. ~Tom Bailey-Robertson, Pastoral Associate

"We remember our compassionate Catholic response to the refugee crisis as well as to the tragedy of the legalization of euthanasia and assisted suicide. Palliative care continues to be undeniably the only moral, effective and much needed alternative, the only truly compassionate choice for the terminally ill and the dying, now that our country has embarked upon this perilous road," the CCCB President writes.
