

HOPE AND LIFE

Today's readings tell the story of two widows. The first reading relates the plight of the widow with whom the prophet Elijah stayed; the Gospel tells about the widow of Nain. In each story, the widow's only son had died. For people who lived in those cultures, the son was the only support of a widow, and the carrying on of the family name by the son was equal to immortality. A widow whose only son has died could lose all hope.

Elijah and Jesus are the restorers of hope; they bring the sons back to life. Saint Paul was metaphorically raised from the dead when he experienced the conversion and call from God that he describes in today's second reading.

What are Christians called to do today? We may not be able to raise the dead, but perhaps we can rekindle hope for a single parent. We may not be able to convert a persecutor like Paul, but if we speak the gospel openly and gently with our lives, we might touch a life with the Good News.

GOSPEL REFLECTION Luke 7:11-17

It's easy to see the continuity of themes among the readings and the Gospel. Jesus, like Elijah and Paul, is also journeying. And, like Elijah, Jesus encounters a widow whose only son has died. This son is already in a coffin and is being carried out for burial. We can only imagine the depth of the widow's grief. She is not begging Jesus to do something-it is not clear that she even notices Him, she is focused only on her loss. It is Jesus who notices her. "He was moved with pity for her." Did He somehow see in her His own mother? Did He realize that Mary's only Son would die too? Was it His love for His own mother that made Him see other women and their pain more clearly? He stops the funeral procession and touches the coffin and tells the dead man to rise. And he does! Now the people around Him recognize Jesus as a great prophet. There is nothing like a miracle to lead the crowd to glorify God. It is a happy ending to this Gospel but of course, it will not last. The crowd is fickle and perhaps some who witnessed this miracle were among those who called for Jesus' death.

Discussion Ouestion: What sights move you to the kind of pity that Jesus felt when He saw the grieving mother? What do you do when you are moved with pity?

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Today we return to using the green vestments of Ordinary Time on Sundays. Changing colors give a sense of the progress of faith through the seasons of life. For centuries, the number of colors and the reasons underlying them were left to local custom.


Over time, we settled on six colors to express the character of a day or season: white, red, green, violet, black, and rose. Black is seldom seen these days, replaced by white or violet. Rose, really a dusty pink shade, appears at most twice a year. What does the color green suggest to you? Green is new growth, olives, evergreens, glistening emeralds, ripening pears, and fields at high summer. It suggests renewal, healing, fertility, peace, and harmony. In medieval Europe, green was the favorite color for brides! Did you know that drivers of green cars are the least likely to be stopped for speeding? Is it because of their own feelings of harmony and well being, or because law enforcement officers are filled with serenity when they see a green car whiz by? Take out a paint chart today and marvel at the many hues and names of green.

The Church figured it out centuries ago: color really matters.
