

The Cathedral Basilica of Christ the King is the principal church of the Diocese of Hamilton and home to the Bishop of Hamilton. The word "cathedral" comes from "cathedra" or Bishop's chair located in the church. On February 25th, 2013, in recognition of the significance of its design, and its importance in the Diocese, the Cathedral was given the status of a *Minor Basilica* by Pope Benedict XVI. The Cathedral Basilica was completed in 1933, and is a very beautiful structure that is reflective of the lively faith of its parishioners and the entire Diocese of Hamilton.

The Cathedral Basilica's *Coat of Arms* presents a shield sheltered by the *ombrellino*, and with crossed keys representing the papal designation of basilica status. The shield has a symbol for Christ with the crown of thorns and the crown of glory. The motto in Latin - *every eye shall see him.*

The *Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults* will begin in the Fall. JOHN 6 The Liturgy of the Word

After the *Introductory Rites* and the *Collect*, we are seated as a Minister of the Word approaches the Ambo. He or she proclaims the first reading – usually taken from the Old

Testament (in Easter it is taken from the Acts of the Apostles). At the conclusion of the proclamation the ministers say, "The word of the Lord." to which we respond, "Thanks be to God." As the Scriptures are being proclaimed we are not idle spectators. We are meant to be drawn into the mystery of God's love for us as it unfolds in the stories of the Scriptures. After the reading, the cantor leads the assembly in the Responsorial Psalm. The book of Psalms in the Old Testament is a collection of the songs of the people of God. They were composed and collected over several centuries and often capture very human emotions and the deepest longings of the human heart. Sundays, a second passage of Sacred Scripture is proclaimed. This passage is usually taken from one of the letters of Saint Paul or other Apostolic writings -Peter, James, John. After this passage has been proclaimed, we stand and sing the great Alleluia to greet the proclamation of the Gospel by the Deacon or Priest. The Gospel is usually a continuous reading from Matthew (Year A), Mark (Year B) or Luke (Year C). The Gospel of John is used in the Christmas, Lent and Easter Seasons and on some other Sundays. This three year cycle is one of the great fruits of the Second Vatican Council (1962-1965) which called for a greater variety in the passages of Scripture used at Mass and in the Sacraments. The Lectionary has been arranged by the Church so that the First Reading and the Gospel often share a common theme. Following the proclamation of the Gospel we are seated for the Homily. This is an important liturgical action on the part of the worshipping community. A good homilist will draw from his own life of prayer to connect the Lord's word with our daily lives. These few moments in the Mass are an opportunity to break open the Word of God. In response to all we have heard in the Scriptures and in the Homily the Church professes its faith and prays for the needs of the world, the sick and the deceased. The celebration of the *Liturgy* of the Word calls us to active listening. It is through the proclamation of the Scriptures and the preaching of the Church that we are spiritually nourished and strengthened to live the Good News each day.

CATHEDRAL IS OPEN

During the months of July and August the Cathedral Basilica will be open to receive visitors who wish to view it or who wish to take time to pray. We will open from 10:00 a.m. until 1:00 p.m. Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday. Greeters will be available in the Cathedral to assist those who are visiting and to answer questions about the Cathedral Basilica.

SOME INSIGHTS FROM Laudato Si

Pope Francis' recently issued Encyclical Letter – *Laudato Si: On the Care of our Common Home* – focuses on a number of important themes:

- ➤ The ecological crisis, Pope Francis writes, is a summons to profound interior conversion to renew our relationships with God, one another, and the created world.
- ➤ God created the world and entrusted it to us as a gift. Now we have the responsibility to care for and protect it and all people, who are part of creation. Protecting human dignity is strongly linked to care for creation.
- ➤ We are connected to the rest of the human family, to the created world, and to those who will come after us in future generations.
- People in poverty have contributed least to climate change, yet they are disproportionately impacted by it. As a result of excessive use of natural resources by wealth nations, those who are poor experience pollution, lack of access to clean water, hunger and more.
- ➤ We are one human family and have a shared responsibility for others and for creation. Wealthy countries have a responsibility to reduce consumption of non-renewable resources and should help poorer nations develop in sustainable ways.
- Concern for nature is incompatible with failure to protect vulnerable human beings the unborn, disabled, or victims of human trafficking.

What can I do?

- Become more aware of our interconnectedness our lifestyle and decisions have an impact on others.
- Changes in our lifestyle and consumption habits can have a positive impact ... re-usable water bottles, shorter showers, walking or biking, composting and the use of energy efficient appliances.
- Support local farmers by purchasing their produce.
- Find out what is happening in local community groups that are working for justice.
