

#### Reflection on Sunday Readings:


Today's Gospel opens with two dejected disciples leaving the community in Jerusalem, and closes with the two of them, rejoicing, back in Jerusalem. Between this opening and closing is the story of their encounter with Jesus, unrecognized. On the road, He explains the Scriptures to them, and in the evening shares in the breaking of the bread when they finally recognize Him. All of this happens on the first day of the week, the very day that the women discovered Jesus' empty tomb. On one level, the story is about the experience of Jesus' disciples after His death and Resurrection; on another level it is the story of Jesus' disciples in later eras and circumstances who also meet Him on their journey. Those who hear this account can see their own questions, actions, and emotions in those of the two Emmaus-bound disciples. And Jesus' words and deeds teach every generation about His identity and how He is present among them.

One of the themes of Luke's Gospel, is the journey of Jesus and His disciples. Earlier in the Gospel, Jesus made the journey to Jerusalem with His followers, both men and women. Now as He walks with these two, it becomes apparent that the risen Jesus is just as present to them as was the earthly Jesus to His disciples. Although the two on the road do not understand what they tell Jesus, they accurately recount His story and the hope that they once had. Their recital is reminiscent of that of Peter, who correctly identified Jesus as the Messiah, even though he did not understand. Peter, the two confused disciples, and present-day believers as well need Jesus to interpret the words of faith that they proclaim. After the disciples on the road review the story of Jesus, the risen Jesus Himself teaches them in the same way He had taught Peter and the other disciples when they made the journey to Jerusalem. He listens to them, questions them, corrects their misunderstanding, and uses the Scriptures to lead them to new knowledge. He explains how the entirety of the Jewish tradition pointed to Him, and that His suffering was necessary for Him to enter into His glory.

When it is nearly evening, they reach Emmaus and invite Jesus, still unrecognized, to stay with them. As they sit at table, Jesus' words and actions repeat what He had done at the last supper, and also anticipate what the Church will do in His name. By the time Luke's

Gospel was written, believers were already celebrating the Lord's Supper in their homes, where the Lord is again present with them. At each of these extraordinary meals, the same actions are repeated: the taking of bread, saying the blessing, breaking the bread, and giving it to the gathered community. St. Augustine affirms the continuing significance:" When is the Lord made known? In this breaking of the bread. ... in the sharing of bread, the Lord is made present".

The two parts of today's Gospel reflect the two parts of the Eucharistic celebration: Liturgy of the Word and Liturgy of the Eucharist. As the disciples met Jesus in both word and sacrament, so too does the Church. When the disciples finally recognized Jesus and remembered that their ears were burning within them as He explained the Scriptures, they returned to the community in Jerusalem. Like these two disciples who told how Jesus was made know to them, now all who participate in the liturgy also go for the to bring the Good News to others. Devotion to the Mother of Good Counsel (Feast Day-April 26th) is associated with the story of a miraculous icon. The sacred image is found in a church in Genazzano, a beautiful town thirty miles south-east of Rome. The church dedicated to the Mother of Good Counsel was built there in the 4th century. In 1356 the church was given over



to the Augustinians. Restoration started in 1467, when a widow, Petruccia, sold all her belongings to help finance the project. However, funds ran out before the task was completed.

That same year, all the residents of Genazzano heard a beautiful melody coming from heaven. As they looked up, they saw a white. shining cloud that descended on the church of the Mother of Good Counsel. The cloud gradually vanished, revealing a beautiful painting of Our Lady tenderly holding her Divine Son in her arms. Immediately, Mary began to cure the sick and grant countless graces.

The news spread throughout the country. Two Albanians from Scutari appeared in the town with a curious tale. They had fled from their homeland to escape the invading Turks. Before fleeing, they had stopped in the church and had seen how the icon of Our Lady, wrapped in a white cloud, lifted off the wall on which it had hung for two centuries. They followed the picture until they could see the towers of Rome, when it suddenly disappeared. The mysterious icon of Genezzano was identical to the one in the church in Scutari.

The amazing news reached Rome. Pope Paul II sent two bishops to investigate the story. The prelates reported that 171 miracles were recorded in the months following the icon's appearance. The pope's commission also found that there was an empty space on the church wall at Scutari. An icon that had been venerated there for centuries was, indeed, missing.

The image was painted on a sheet of plaster so thin that it would have been impossible for any human hand to remove it without damage. It had survived the subsequent centuries through the tumult of several earthquakes and withstood the bombing during World War II. Several altars were destroyed, walls caved in, and the roof was crushed. The icon, only yards away from the explosion, remained intact.

The icon at Genazzano is about 12" wide & 18" high. It depicts a mother figure that is half turned toward her son and half toward the viewer, reflecting Mary's concern for both Jesus and his Church.

If Our Blessed Mother is willing to ask her Son to work miracles to let us know of her motherly concern, Our Lady of Good Counsel is certainly willing to speak words of advice and instruction to help us over the hurdles of our daily lives. 
