John Chrysostom announces, in this famous Easter sermon, that all are invited to the feast:

#### "Let all then enter the joy of Our Lord!

Both the first and the last, and those who come after, enjoy your reward! Rich and poor, dance with one another, sober and slothful, celebrate the day. Those who have kept the fast and those who have not, rejoice today, for the table is richly spread.

Fare royally upon it-the calf is a fatted one. Let no one go away hungry. All of you, enjoy the banquet of faith! All enjoy the riches of His goodness. Let no one cry over his poverty, for the universal Kingdom has appeared! Let no one mourn that he has fallen again and again, for forgiveness has risen from the grave.

Let none fear death, for the death of our Saviour has set us free. He has destroyed it by enduring it.

He spoiled the power of hell when he descended thereto.

Isaiah foretold this when he cried, 'Death has been frustrated in meeting him below!' It is frustrated, for it is destroyed. It is frustrated, for it is annihilated. It is frustrated, for now it is made captive.

For it grabbed a body and discovered God.

It took earth and behold! It encountered Heaven.

It took what was visible, and was overcome by what was invisible.

O Death, where is your sting? O Death, where is your victory?


Christ is risen, and the demons are cast down.

## APRIL 17, 2022

On **Holy Saturday**, we remember that Jesus descended into hell where He preached the Gospel to those who died before and opened the way to heaven for all those who were worthy. There is no Mass of the Day on Holy Saturday. Rather, we spend the day in prayer, waiting at the Tomb for the Glorious Resurrection of the Lord Jesus Christ. Saturday Evening is the Easter Vigil Liturgy. In keeping with the ancient Hebrew understanding, the Vigil, sundown, begins the new day.

The Easter Vigil liturgy is the most beautiful liturgy in the Roman Catholic Church. It is divided into four parts: Service of Light, Liturgy of the Word, Liturgy of Baptism, and Liturgy of the Eucharist.



- <u>Service of Light</u> - The atmosphere in the church is different: the holy water fonts are drained, all the lights are out, the tabernacle is empty. The service begins outside the church. A new fire is lit and blessed. The paschal candle, representing Christ, is brought to the priest, who cuts a cross into the candle with a stylus. Then he makes the Greek letter Alpha above the cross, the letter Omega below, and the four numerals of the

current year between the arms of the cross, saying meanwhile: *Christ* yesterday and today, the Beginning and the End, the Alpha and the Omega. All time belongs to him and all the ages. To him be glory and power through every age and for ever. Amen.

Then the priest inserts five grains of incense into the candle in the form of a cross, meanwhile saying: *By his holy and glorious wounds, may Christ the Lord guard us and protect us. Amen.* 

The priest lights the candle from the new fire, saying: *May the light of Christ, rising in glory, dispel the darkness of our hearts and minds.* 

The Pascal Candle is brought into the church and all light their tapers from it. The Easter Proclamation - *Exsultet* is sung. It tells of humanity's sin, of God's mercy, and of the great love of the Redeemer for mankind, admonishing us in turn to thank the Trinity for all the graces that have been lavished upon us.



- <u>Liturgy of the Word</u> - During the Easter vigil, nine readings are provided: seven Old Testament and two New Testament. Not all are required to be read due to time constraints, but at least three Old Testament readings must be read, including Exodus 14. These readings help us meditate on the wonderful works of

God for His people since the beginning of time. The readings are: The story of creation, *Gen 1:1-2; 2;* Abraham and Isaac, *Gen 22:1-18;* Crossing of the Red Sea, *Exodus 14:15–15:1;* The Love of God, *Isaiah 54:5-14;* The Everlasting Covenant, *Isaiah 55:1-11;* Wisdom, the Prerogative of Israel, *Baruch 3:9-15, 32–4:4;* Oracle of New Heart *Ezekiel 36:16-17,18-28;* Baptism in Christ, *Romans 6:3-11;* and *Gospel of Luke 24:1-12.* 

The Gloria is sung before the reading of the Epistle of the Romans, and the Alleluia is sung before the Gospel.

- <u>Liturgy of Baptism</u> - During this time the Easter water is blessed, new members are brought into the Church through baptism, part of the liturgy includes the Litany of the Saints. There are also those who were baptized, but haven't received the other sacraments of initiation. The catechumens and these faithful are confirmed and will later receive the Holy Eucharist. Afterwards the faithful are blessed with water and all renew their baptismal promises.





- <u>Liturgy of Eucharist</u> - The Mass continues, with the special prayers inserted during the Eucharist Prayer. The whole church is called to join at the sacrificial table that Christ prepared for us through his death and resurrection. After

Communion the Mass concludes with the Solemn Blessing: May

almighty God bless you through today's Easter Solemnity and, in His compassion, defend you from every assault of sin. R. Amen. And may He, who restores you to eternal life in the Resurrection of His Only Begotten, endow you with the prize of immortality. R. Amen. Now that the days of the Lord's Passion have drawn to a close, may you who celebrate the gladness of the Paschal Feast come with Christ's help, and exulting in spirit, to those feasts that are celebrated in eternal joy. R. Amen. And may the blessing of almighty God, the Father, the Son, + and of the Holy Spirit, come down on you and remain with you for ever. R. Amen.

and closes with the glorious dismissal: *Go in peace, alleluia, alleluia.* R. Thanks be to God, alleluia, alleluia. *(From Catholicculture.org)*


