Reflection on the First Reading: Acts of the Apostles 15:1-2, 22-29

Today's reading from the Acts of the Apostles is a sort of bookend account of a major controversy in Jerusalem concerning how Gentiles should be accepted into the faith. First, we have visitors from Judea arriving in Antioch, who demand that converts need to be circumcised. Then, the reading jumps to the written response prepared in Jerusalem and delivered to the Church in Antioch announcing that Gentiles would be exempt from circumcision. What is missing in today's reading is the debate that took place in between. Peter and James offer brief but eloquent testimony that God does not wish to place distinctions among His people. Thus, the decision is made not to make things unnecessarily difficult for those who were turning from paganism to belief in Christ.

While Paul covers the discussion in his letter to the Galatians (2:1 -10), Luke's reporting of the story is much more peaceful. The debate at Jerusalem produces three resolutions. First, those Jewish Christians who had stirred up the Gentiles lacked authority in their teaching. For this reason, the Jerusalem Church now sends Judas (Barsabbas) and Silas as credible witnesses to the truth. Second, those who turn from paganism to Christ are to be considered exempt from the Mosaic Law and the tradition of circumcision. Finally, Gentile Christians are to abstain from several customs held by some outside the faith, namely, eating meat that was sacrificed to idols, eating meat with blood in it, eating meat of strangled animals (instead of meat from ritual slaughter), and marriages with close family members.

There is a genuine sense of collaboration in this Scripture passage, as the Apostles "with the consent of the whole Church" calmly select representatives to quiet the turmoil instigated by the Jewish Christians at Antioch. In their wise debate, the apostles restore the credibility of Paul and Barnabas, "who have risked their lives for the sake of our Lord Jesus Christ". Furthermore, the letter sent from Jerusalem acknowledges the work of the Holy Spirit in guiding the deliberation. As the early Church spread rapidly throughout the Mediterranean regions, one of the central concerns was the unity of faith. The dispute concerning the requirement of circumcision provides the Church with the opportunity to enter into the work of discernment and clearly define what is necessary for Christian unity.

Video study program after both Sunday Masses in the Large Hall. Video (20 min.) plus brief discussion. Refreshments. Come and check it out. Synopsis of the previous session ("Preserving the Truth"):

The Apostles appointed the first successor to take the office vacated by Judas in the Book of Acts. We see more examples of apostolic succession in the writings of Paul. In 2 Timothy, we hear how Paul personally appointed Timothy to follow after him by the laying on of hands. We see the laying on of hands in other places with regard to the sacrament of Holy Orders as well (2 Tim 1:6, 1 Tim 4:13-14). The Fathers saw the same thing. In fact, they discuss how ordination and succession needed to be an orderly process.

True unity comes through the visible Church established by Christ. Simply having a Bible in hand isn't enough. Remember that at the time of St. Ignatius, there was no canon of scripture. There is little doubt the bishop was familiar with some of the writings of the New Testament, but he was confident of preaching the apostolic gospel because he was in communion with the apostolic Church. He knew, as Paul says, that the Church is the "pillar and bulwark of truth" (1 Tim 3:15). Scripture and Tradition make it clear: if you want to know the Truth, then you must know the Church. It is the mission of the Church to preserve the truth and hand it on to all people.

In that Church, the Bishop of Rome has pre-eminence over the other bishops. Clement was the fourth Bishop of Rome (Pope). Around the year AD 90 he wrote to the church in Corinth. He speaks with authority, despite the fact that he is Bishop of Rome and he is speaking to Christians in faraway Greece. The people of Corinth had turned to Rome to settle a dispute, and Clement answers then with authority and fatherly assurance. The Church has always recognized that the Bishop of Rome, as successor of St. Peter, holds preeminent authority.

The Fathers of the Church are rightly concerned with unity, which is maintained through the Eucharist. Through the priesthood, instituted by Christ (John 17), united under one head (the Pope), we are nourished by Christ in the Holy Eucharist. We have to remember that receiving the Body and Blood of Christ in Holy Communion not only symbolizes our communion with God and His Church, it makes possible that communion. So to receive the Eucharist when one does not hold the doctrines of Christ, or when one has been gravely disobedient to Christ and His Church, is sacrilege.

If we want to know the truth of Christ, we have to listen to those He entrusted with His message: the Apostles and their successors.

Saint Philip Neri was a sign of contradiction, combining popularity with piety against the background of a corrupt Rome and a disinterested clergy: the whole post-Renaissance malaise. At an early age, Philip abandoned the chance to become a businessman, moved to Rome from Florence,


and devoted his life and individuality to God. After three years of philosophy and theology studies, he gave up any thought of ordination. The next 13 years were spent in a vocation unusual at the time—that of a layman actively engaged in prayer and the apostolate.

As the Council of Trent (1545-63) was reforming the Church on a doctrinal level, Philip's appealing personality was winning him friends from all levels of society, from beggars to cardinals. He rapidly gathered around himself a group of laymen won over by his audacious spirituality. Initially, they met as an informal prayer and discussion group, and also served poor people in Rome.

At the urging of his confessor, Philip was ordained a priest and soon became an outstanding confessor himself, gifted with the knack of piercing the pretences and illusions of others, though always in a charitable manner and often with a joke. He arranged talks, discussions, and prayers for his penitents in a room above the church. He sometimes led "excursions" to other churches, often with music and a picnic on the way. Some of Philip's followers became priests and lived together in community. This was the beginning of the Oratory, the religious institute he founded. A feature of their life was a daily afternoon service of four informal talks, with vernacular hymns and prayers. Giovanni Palestrina was one of Philip's followers, and composed music for the services. The Oratory was finally approved after suffering through a period of accusations of being an assembly of heretics, where laymen preached and sang vernacular hymns!

Philip's advice was sought by many of the prominent people. He is one of the influential figures of the Counter-Reformation, mainly for converting to personal holiness many of the influential people within the Church itself. His characteristic virtues were humility and gaiety.

After spending a day hearing confessions Philip Neri suffered a haemorrhage and died on the feast of Corpus Christi in 1595. He was beatified in 1615 and canonized in 1622. In 1848, Card. John Henry Newman founded the first English speaking house of the Oratory in UK. *(From franciscanmedia.com)*
