



Reflections on the First Reading: Daniel 12: 1-3

As we approach the end of the liturgical year, these scriptures remind us that we live in the final stage of humankind's story, the stage that began with Jesus' death and Resurrection. This reading is an apocalyptic work whose aim is to display God's consistent involvement in all creation, including political and international affairs on earth. Taking the long view, apocalyptic writers emphasize that while worldly kingdoms and governments rise and fall, God's kingdom is invincible and unending.

The author of Daniel writes about signs that will mark the end of times as we know it. These include earthly and cosmic upheavals and the persecution of those who remain faithful to God. A figure called Michael, who is identified here as the great prince and guardian of Israel, will play an unspecified role in these events.

"Those who are wise shall shine like the brightness of the sky"; they are sages who, like Daniel, work to persuade others to live by God's decrees. The notion that these wise teachers shall live forever is a rare allusion to resurrection in the Old Testament, though other Jewish apocalyptic works of this period ponder some form of life after death. (From the Workbook for Lectors, Gospel Readers, and Proclaimers of the Word)

Three parenting tips from St. Joseph - The Year of St. Joseph inspires a parent to look closely at the earthly father of Jesus. Excerpt from Matt Paolelli's article from Oct. 27/21 in uscatholic.org

It might sound a bit cliché to say that St. Joseph is one of my favourite saints. For a long time, it honestly kind of was. When asked that oft-repeated Catholic icebreaker question, I felt like St. Joseph ought to be one of my favorite saints. With four kids ages 5 and under, I should probably find myself in nearly constant intercessory prayer to St. Anthony ("Where are their shoes?!"), St. Jude ("Just let me make it through bedtime!"), and St. Joseph ("You had it easy. Your kid was Jesus!").

Fatherhood clichés aside, I wanted St. Joseph to be more of a spiritual warrior in my personal army of saints, but my relationship with him didn't feel all that authentic or particularly deep. How can you get to know someone who never speaks in the Bible? And after the birth of Jesus and the flight to Egypt, he pretty much vanishes.

When Pope Francis declared 2021 the Year of St. Joseph, however, I felt this could be my chance to truly get to know Joe. *Patris Corde (With a Father's Heart)*, the pope's apostolic letter released to kick off the Year of St. Joseph, paints a beautiful and intriguing picture of St. Joseph and his spiritual character, with a variety of traits I hadn't previously ascribed to this adoptive father of Jesus.

My curiosity was piqued, so I embarked on the 33-day Consecration to St. Joseph using the book by Fr. Donald Calloway. This spiritual exercise forced me to meditate on the life, experience, and intercessory power of St. Joseph in a new way. By extrapolating from various Bible passages and exploring the writings of other saints, popes, and biblical scholars, I came away with a renewed sense of awe at his dedication to the complementary vocations of marriage and fatherhood. The journey also illuminated a few crucial parenting tips.

Trust God - Out of all the biblical figures, St. Joseph must rank pretty highly in terms of those who had to accept outlandish-sounding life plans from God. Marry a woman who conceived a baby through the Holy Spirit? Sure thing! Oversee childbirth in a manger? OK! Flee to Egypt with a newborn? No problem! Serve as head of a household where you're the only one capable of committing a sin? Of course!

On this side of the resurrection, all those details fall into place as part of God's plan for the world. St. Joseph, however, was a mere mortal like the rest of us and still managed to exhibit complete trust in God even when he didn't know how the story would end. (To be continued).

St. Elizabeth of Hungary's Story (1207 – November 17, 1231)



In her short life, Elizabeth manifested such great love for the poor and suffering that she has become the patroness of Catholic charities and of the Secular Franciscan Order. The daughter of the King of Hungary, Elizabeth chose a life of penance and asceticism when a life of leisure and luxury could easily have been hers. This choice endeared her in the hearts of the common people throughout Europe.

At the age of 14, Elizabeth was married to Louis of Thuringia, whom she deeply loved. She bore three children. Under the spiritual direction of a Franciscan friar, she led a life of prayer, sacrifice, and service to the poor and sick. Seeking to become one with the poor, she wore simple clothing. Daily she would take bread to hundreds of the poorest in the land who came to her gate.

After six years of marriage, her husband died in the Crusades, and Elizabeth was grief-stricken. Her husband's family looked upon her as squandering the royal purse, mistreated her, and threw her out of the palace. The return of her husband's allies from the Crusades resulted in her being reinstated, since her son was legal heir to the throne.

In 1228, Elizabeth joined the Secular Franciscan Order, spending the remaining few years of her life caring for the poor in a hospital which she founded in honour of St. Francis of Assisi. Elizabeth's health declined, and she died before her 24th birthday in 1231. Her great popularity resulted in her canonization four years later.

Elizabeth understood well the lesson Jesus taught when he washed his disciples' feet at the Last Supper: The Christian must be one who serves the humblest needs of others, even if one serves from an exalted position. Of royal blood, Elizabeth could have lorded it over her subjects. Yet she served them with such a loving heart that her brief life won for her a special place in the hearts of many. Elizabeth is also an example to us in her following the guidance of a spiritual director. Growth in the spiritual life is a difficult process. We can play games very easily if we don't have someone to challenge us.
