Sunday programs for children - During the Sunday morning 9:30 a.m. Mass there is babysitting for children under 3 years of age, Sunday School for 3 to 6 years of age and Children's Liturgy of the Word for children ages 7 and up.

Sacramental Life - St. Louis Parish celebrates the sacraments for its members who are registered and regularly attending. If you are not registered you are automatically a member of a parish closest to you.

Baptism - Celebrated once a month. Please speak with a priest after Mass on Sunday.

Sacrament of Reconciliation - Saturdays 4 - 4:30 p.m., or by appointment.

Marriage - For registered and supporting members, please contact the parish office at least one year in advance of your date.

Becoming Catholic - Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults, preparing adults for baptism and/or to join the community. Please contact the office for further information.

Anointing and Pastoral Care - Our parish community cares about the sick and elderly and the lonely. Please notify the parish office to arrange for them to receive the Annointing of the Sick, or to have the Holy Communion brought to them.

Reflection on the Second Reading : 1 Corinthians 15:20 -26, 28.

Paul teaches that Christian faith and hope are based on Jesus' being raised from the dead. He calls Christ the first fruits of those who have "fallen asleep" (the Greek verb form emphasizes that they are "still sleeping"). In this passage, the first fruits are not so much an offering as a pledge or guarantee of "the crop" of believers who will be harvested at the end of time.

Paul's comparison of Adam with Christ is of the first man, who represents all humanity, with the last man, who is Christ. The first man (all humans) must die, but the last man died and was raised up from the dead – as will be all those who are baptized into Him. They shall certainly be "made alive," but in the proper order, that is, in God's order. First, Jesus was raised, then He will return to earth, at which time all the dead will be raised up, and then literally, "the end" will occur, or the last thing will be the risen Christ handing the kingdom over to the Father.

The Corinthians, like the baptized today, live between Christ's Resurrection and His (second) "coming" or "arrival," in Greek, His *parousia.* The image of Christ putting all His enemies under His feet draws on Psalm 110:1, which was read during enthronement rites for a king of Israel or Judah. The psalm itself borrows images from the biblical world that show a ruler who is seated on his throne, using the heads of vanquished enemies for his footstool. The risen Christ will rule until all His enemies are under His feet, the last of these being death. In "the end," when everything is subjected to God, divine life will permeate and enliven all that exists. (From the *Workbook for Lectors, Gospel Readers, and Proclaimers of the Word.*)

St. Andrew Düng-Lac and Companions' Story

Andrew Dũng-Lac, a Catholic convert ordained as a priest, was one of 117 people martyred in Vietnam between 1820 and 1862. Members of the companions group gave their lives for Christ in the 17th-19th centuries were canonized by St. John Paul II.

Christianity came to Vietnam through the Portuguese. Jesuits opened the first permanent mission at Da Nang in 1615. They ministered to Japanese Catholics who had been driven from Japan.

Severe persecutions were launched at least three times in the 19th century. Between 100,000 and 300,000 Catholics were killed or subjected to great hardship. Foreign missionaries martyred in included priests of the Paris Mission Society, and Spanish Dominicans.

In 1832, Emperor Minh-Mang banned all foreign missionaries, and tried to make all Vietnamese deny their faith by trampling on a crucifix. Like the priest-holes in Ireland during English persecution, many hiding places were offered in homes of the faithful.

Persecution broke out again in 1847, when the emperor suspected foreign missionaries and Vietnamese Christians of sympathizing with a rebellion led by of one of his sons.

The last of the martyrs were 17 laypersons executed in 1862. That year a treaty with France guaranteed religious freedom to Catholics, but it did not stop all persecution.

By 1954, there were over a million Catholics—about 7% of the population—in the north. Buddhists represented about 60 %. Persistent persecution forced some 670,000 Catholics to flee to the south. In 1964, there were still 833,000 Catholics in the north, but many were in prison. In the south, Catholics were enjoying the first decade of religious freedom in centuries, their numbers swelled by refugees.

During the Vietnamese war, Catholics again suffered in the north, and again moved to the south in great numbers. Now reunited, the entire country is under Communist rule. (*From franciscanmedia.org*)

BILL C-7 - An Act to amend the Criminal Code Expansion of eligibility criteria for physician-assisted dying
