* A Message from the Pastor



The Eternal Value of the Human Person

This Saturday, November 11th, is Remembrance Day in Canada. It began as a memorial of the 11th hour, of the 11th day, of the 11th month, in which the Armistice was signed, concluding the conflict of what we call in the West, the First World War. By some, at the time, it was called the "war to end all wars" because of the tremendous loss of life.

With a rising global population, every day we become more aware of how much our lives affect one another. Political and social life, of course, are not so simple. The present Holy Father reminds us fairly regularly that the one thing we cannot become is indifferent. War is neither a human certainty nor are we automatically protected from humans fighting with each other. Pope St. John Paul II had a highly developed theology of the human person as being in relationships with others and in a relationship with God. His academic life, before becoming a bishop, was devoted to this area, drawing upon St. Thomas Aquinas but adding his own research and thought as well. It still informs much of how the Church presents her

social teachings. The human person is always in and destined for relationships. We are more than beings who socialize. The arc of our lives is oriented toward fulfillment in and through relationships. In faith we see the most penetrating of relationships is with God, which can also be found everywhere in our human relationships as well.

In 2012, I retraced the steps of my dad's service during the Second World War, and visited a number of sites in Holland. At the Canadian War Cemetery for the Battle of the Scheldt, I walked slowly through all the rows of graves, some 1,300. Here were young men who willingly went to safeguard the freedoms we now take for granted. Honouring that sacrifice is important. We are also called to make some sacrifices, to have a mature democracy that can support us and allow us to work to improve the conditions of others. My father didn't regard what he had done as something extraordinary. He had a very sober view of war and found dignity in doing his part. He was tremendously grateful that Ann and I were able to grow up in peaceful conditions.

As the world cries out for pathways forward, it is to be hoped and prayed that balance is found. While religion is often blamed for many of the world's problems, I am afraid that it is often something much simpler; power and empire. World War I was a competition among empires that caused some of them to fade away. After the more disturbing World War II, modern Europe emerged to try to balance the aspirations of the various countries. The ebbing of western colonialism has been taking place over a longer period of time and is still ongoing.

Building is always more difficult than destroying. Building is the kind of sacrifice that can mirror a little bit of the Kingdom and give hope too many while witnessing to our faith. As we remember those who have died in the conflicts that have given us our freedoms, let us include the many who have died in all sorts of conflicts, whose graves are not straight rows. May their cries reach heaven and may wounds in their families and succeeding generations be healed.
