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"Look at My Hands and My Feet"

It was not easy for the apostles to believe that Jesus had risen and was alive in their presence. Even though He had previously announced His resurrection and promised to overcome death, their fear prevented them from seeing this Good News. The risen Lord insisted that He was not a ghost. "Why are you troubled....? Look at my hands and my feet; see that it is I myself!" The marks of the nails were still there. They are signs of victory!

This is what we call "REPARATION". God is able to fix what has been broken even though some marks of suffering might remain. We wish our faults could be forgotten and our offences erased. However, our human experience reveals that it is easier to forgive than to forget. Forgiveness is about giving ourselves and others another chance and trusting that we have learned from our mistakes, even if we still remember them. It's about restoring and healing our past, so our wounds will not hurt anymore. If we really believe in forgiveness, the memory of our faults will no longer bother us.

A great mystery surrounds the glorious body of Jesus. He crosses closed doors; He eats with His apostles and invites them to touch His wounds. No one allows a person to touch their scars unless they have been completely healed. With this gesture, Jesus invites us to think about our own frailty. We do not need to hide our past wounds, nor be ashamed of them. They are sacred! Get rid of the ghosts that keep you afraid of condemnation. Jesus calls us to experience a new life conquered by the Crucified-Risen Lord. The wounded body of Jesus is now incorruptible; it will not see death anymore. One day, our bodies will also be entirely transformed so we will fully share the glory of God and eternal life.
