SOCIAL JUSTICE NEWS....

Social Justice, Fair Trade, Eat Local

Unless climate change really goes wild, we won't be buying locally grown coffee, tea, and chocolate for some time. But, at least at this time of year, we should try to apply Fair Trade principles when we eat. If we don't grow our own fruits and vegetables, we can support, as directly as possible, local family farmers. Community Shared Agriculture (CSA) growers are the recent alternative to driving out to pick-your-own operations and farm-gate stands, and newer Farmers' Markets (e.g., Thursday afternoons on Locke, Friday afternoons at Christ Church Cathedral on James North, and Saturday mornings by Sacred Heart Church on the Mountain Brow until the fall; year-round Saturday mornings at the Sky Dragon Centre on King William or Fridays and Saturdays off Ottawa Street) conscientiously insist that everything for sale is locally produced. Buying elsewhere, especially in supermarkets, requires careful attention to where the food comes from: be aware that cheaper imported products may have both hidden higher environmental and human (i.e., exploited workers) costs, and also lower nutritional values and less taste than local produce, since the imports almost certainly won't be as fresh. in the right time. "It's time to eat." "It's time to go to bed." It's time to go." Almost instinctively, we already know what to do and when.

In our gospel today we sense the tension between the two sisters Martha and Mary as Martha launches her complaint to Jesus about Mary not helping her. The truth is, in many households, many women, especially, can identify with her. Women, by and large — even if they work outside the house full time — still do the lion's portion of household chores and life maintenance for the family. Yet, in the gospel, Jesus praises Mary for listening as a disciple would. Last Sunday, we heard Jesus telling the lawyer to go and do as the Samaritan had done for the man who had been beaten and robbed. So, even in Jesus, there is a recognition that both being and doing are necessary; it's just a question of when to do what. The truth is, as always, somewhere in the middle . . . maybe.

I made my retreat before ordination to the priesthood at Gethsemane, the Trappist monastery in the hills of Kentucky where Thomas Merton lived and is buried. I remember thinking that there was some part of me that thought I would return there after serving many years in active ministry to finish out my life as a monk. Those thoughts were more fantasy than reality for me but I knew that it was going to be important to reflect on what I would be doing as a priest so that my work would not just be pure activism.

As scripture scholar, Charles B. Cousar [Westminster John Know Press, Louisville, KY: 1994] has said: "Doing with listening can easily degenerate into busyness that loses its purpose. Listening without doing soon becomes no more than a mockery of the words." And philosopher Soren Kierkegaard wrote that "an unreflected life is not worth living." For me, this balance of action and reflection has been an elusive, but no less important, goal. I think it is for all of us, or most of us at least. There will be individuals that are called primarily to action or to reflection exclusively. One of my cousins is a cloistered Benedictine nun. But certainly, those people are the exception. The rest of us need a balanced rhythm, an ebb and flow of breathing in and out of thinking and doing.

Perhaps that is one of the gifts of summer, to be able to take time to re-create, to step back from work and explore another side of life, the inside. I hope to use my recovery time from hip surgery in the next few weeks to engage in just such inside work, to have some "Mary" time. The duties of "Martha" will still be there at the end of the day. May all of us open ourselves to the rhythm of life that God calls us to. It is time!
