The Central place of the Cross in the design reminds us that the source of our joy is our encounter with Jesus Christ who gave us new life by his death on the Cross. It is also a reminder that all baptized have been claimed by his cross and share in the mystery of his death and resurrection. The baptismal roots of



Christian faith are further signified by the water flowing from the shell and the blue background. The shell is often used in the celebration of Baptism and is also a symbol of pilgrimage. Our celebration of the year of Faith is but one privileged moment of grace as we, the People of God, make our pilgrimage to our heavenly homeland where we will see God face to face and enjoy the blessedness of eternal life.

FAST, FREE & CONFIDENTIAL INCOME TAX SERVICE

April 4, (5-7pm) April 8, (10am-12) & April 11, (5-7pm) are the last dates that volunteers with the Canada Revenue Agency's Community Volunteer Income Tax Program (CVITP) will be completing 2012 Income Tax Returns for low income Canadians. Candidates whose 2012 annual income was approx. \$30,000 or less for singles, and approx. \$40,000 or less for families are eligible. This tax clinic's focus is the St. Joseph parish community and is staffed & co-ordinated by CVITP volunteers - *not by St. Joseph Parish staff.* Come to the meeting room below the church office 260 Herkimer Street, Hamilton. Your return will be prepared and EFILED to the CRA and your paperwork will be available for pick-up after e-filing.

Desk Scribbles . . . Easter . . . March 31, 2013 . . . Jim Link, CR Acts 10:34, 37-43; Ps 118; Col. 3:1-4; John 20:1-18

The great Dutch theologian Edward Schillebeekx remarked that nobody actually saw Jesus rising from the dead; nobody was there but something happened. How else, he reflected, can you explain the fact that the disciples were locked away in fear one day, hiding out and the next day they were out on the street preaching the resurrection of Jesus and unafraid to die.

When we think of the resurrection of Jesus from the dead it is hard to get away from the image of the lifeless corpse of the crucified Jesus somehow just waking up or coming to life from under the white shroud in which he was wrapped. But the body of the resurrected Jesus was not the same body that went into the tomb; if it were the same body, then why didn't Mary Magdalene recognize him in the garden just three days after his death. No, the resurrected body of Jesus was indeed a real body but different. No longer bound by time or space; it was transformed, transfigured, changed. Like the Big Bang at the beginning of creation, the resurrection of Jesus exploded in the center of creation giving meaning to everything to follow. And more than the scientific and mechanical understanding of what actually happened in the resurrection, what concerns you and me is what followed this pivotal event.

Many years ago I was at one on my religious communities Easter dinners. That year it was being held at St. Louis Parish in Waterloo. After we had Mass together we went down to the church hall to have dinner. It was a buffet that night and I sat down as the older members of the community got up to load their plates. We are a small religious community and, for the most part, we all know each other and our backgrounds. As each member stood in line, their life stories and my experience of living and working with them in community came to mind. It was a motley assortment of bright, gifted, talented men who had served as university professors, high school teachers, pastors, administrators, cooks, maintenance, custodians, grounds keepers, missionaries and other assorted ministries. But among the "wheat" of their lives were also sown "weeds." Woven in the life tapestries of these men were struggles with alcoholism, depression, anger mismanagement, low self-esteem and other dark threads of mental, emotional, and psychological dysfunction. The strange thing for me is that I had a powerful feeling of being at home with these men because my life too is an intermingling of wheat and weeds. The incredible part of this whole experience of truth and reality is that we can face it because of the resurrection of Jesus. "The great gift of Easter is hope," said Cardinal Basil Hume.

It is this hope that helps us to stand directly in front of the stone rolled across the tombs of our lives and still believe in life and not give into death. We hold onto hope believing that the signs of death --- in whatever form they appear --- will not overcome the life that has been won for us through the death and resurrection of Jesus. Darkness will never overpower the light emerging from the tomb.

As St. Paul wrote to the Philippians, "I want to know Christ and the power of his resurrection and the sharing of his sufferings by becoming like him in his death, if somehow I may attain the resurrection from the dead." (3:10-11) We need to let the power of that explosive resurrection permeate our minds, hearts, spirits and bodies. We need to chant again and again the Alleluia that gives us hope in the face of trial and adversity. And we need to share that hope with others. There is a saying attributed to St. Francis: "Preach the gospel always; if necessary, use words." The men of my own community passed that hope and belief in resurrection onto me. May we all share it with each other. Christ is Risen! Alleluia! Happy Easter!
