EVANGELIZATION MADE EASY - PART 4

Today's Readings: 1 Sam 16:1, 6–7, 10–13 Psalm 23:1–6 Ephesians 5:8–14 John 9:1–41

God's Word exhorts us to always have a ready answer for our faith. Can you share our faith in 100 words? Further Reflection from the Catechism: CCC: 1865–1869 CCCC: 393, 7, 9, 400 YOUCAT: 315-320

Recap: We've been looking at how to improve our likelihood of success in sharing the Gospel with those whom God has placed on our paths by better understanding human motivation. So far in this series we've explored how people cross a series of thresholds on their journey to mature Christian discipleship and how many of us respond particularly strongly to one of the transcendentals. We also recognized that each new generation brings with it certain challenges to receiving the Good News.

So, what is the Good News: Within the Catholic Church we have a veritable smorgasbord of spiritual treasures – a real feast that includes the Sacraments, Communion of Saints, Sacred Tradition, Sacred Scripture and so much more. But, just as babies start with milk, then move on to pablum and eventually ever increasing varieties of solid food, people coming to faith in Christ are not ready for the plethora of solid spiritual food. Each of them, ourselves included, must begin with the basics.

THE KERYGMA (Core Gospel Message) in about 100 WORDS

- 1.) God made us for a loving relationship with Him, giving us free will so that we could freely choose to love Him.
- 2.) Abuse of free will, sin, broke that relationship, creating a humanly unbridgeable gap between us and God for all eternity.
- 3.) Through His passion, death on the Cross and resurrection, Jesus offers us a way to restore that relationship.
- 4.) Restoration is ours if we individually and freely accept Jesus as our Lord and Saviour. Such a decision normally implies Baptism, ongoing discipleship, participation in the worshipping community and bringing the Good News to others, all in the power of God's Spirit.

Culture plays an important role in how we hand on the faith. Our culture used to be immersed in the Christian faith. By virtue of that, to some degree the culture helped in the transmission of the faith from one generation to the next. In North America we can no longer rely on culture to fill that role. Because of that void, we have multiple generations that are, in many cases, Sacramentalized yet not well evangelized. People may know the routine to some degree, yet not have embraced a mature relationship with the Living God. We must approach matters in a different way, a personal way.



If we want the real deal and not to simply be going through the motions, we owe it to ourselves to understand the core Gospel message, embrace it and become comfortable in sharing it with a world that is starving for the right spiritual food.

BEING JESUS' DISCIPLES DOES NOT MEAN LIVING AS A BESIEGED CITADEL

Vatican City, 19 January 2014 (VIS) – Pope Francis commented on the Gospel reading in which St. John the Evangelist narrates the encounter between Jesus and the Baptist by the River Jordan. The Baptist



sees Jesus move through the crowd and recognises Him as God's envoy, exclaiming, "Behold, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world!". "The verb translated as 'take away' literally means 'relieve', 'take upon oneself'", explained the Pontiff. "Jesus came into the world with a precise mission: to free it from the bondage of sin, taking upon Himself the guilt of humanity. How? Through love. There is no other way of defeating evil and sin other than through love, which leads to giving one's own life for others. In John the Baptist's account, Jesus has the features of the Servant of the Lord, who 'has borne our griefs and carried our sorrows' unto death on the Cross".

In the Jordan the Baptist encounters a man "who lines up with the sinners to be baptised, even though he has no need. A man who God has sent to the world as a sacrificial lamb. In the New Testament, the word 'lamb' is recurrent, used always with reference to Jesus. This image of the lamb appears surprising; indeed, an animal that is certainly not characterised by strength or robustness takes upon its shoulders such an oppressive burden. The great weight of evil is removed and taken away by a weak and fragile creature, a symbol of obedience, docility and defenceless love, to the point of self-sacrifice. The lamb does not dominate, but instead it is docile; it is peaceful, not aggressive; it does not show its claws or bare its teeth when faced with attackers, but instead suffers and submits. And this is how Jesus is: like a lamb". "What does it mean for the Church, for us today, to be disciples of Jesus, lamb of God?" asked Pope Francis. "It is a good task! As Christians we must replace malice with innocence, force with love, pride with humility, and prestige with service. Being disciples of the Lamb means living not like a besieged citadel, but rather as a city set on a mountain, open, welcoming and supportive. It does not mean adopting a closed attitude, but rather proposing the Gospel to all, showing by the witness of our lives that following Jesus makes us freer and more joyful".
