FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Christianity, as a religion, has a great story to tell. It is such a great story that as we attend Holy Mass on the birthday of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, we hear four different sets of Scripture readings. The Christmas Vigil reading from Matthew traces the genealogy of Jesus from Joseph back to Abraham. Christmas Eve's Liturgy gives us Luke's account of Mary and Joseph' sojourn to Bethlehem to be registered, Jesus' birth in the stable and the announcement to the shepherds. Christmas Dawn continues Luke's story as the shepherd's come to worship Jesus while his amazed mother looked on. On Christmas day, we hear John's poetic, symbolic account of Jesus as the pre-existent Word of God. All these are attempts of the Evangelists to explain to us who Jesus is and why he is so important to our lives.

As we celebrate this day, we should also ask ourselves, who is this Jesus to me and what is the meaning of his birth and life?

The four gospel writers drew on their own culture and everyday concerns to answer these questions. For Matthew, Jesus is squarely set with the Jewish patriarchs beginning with Abraham. Jesus is the absolute and perfect fulfillment of the Mosaic Law. Luke, on the other hand, wants us to see that Jesus is also much more than the fulfillment of the Mosaic Law; he is the savior of all people, especially the poor and the marginalized typified by Mary and the shepherds. John sees Jesus in nearly cosmic terms, as the Word of God who has always been and always will be one with God.

Which of the four gospel stories speaks to you most this Christmas? Last November, I led a group of pilgrims mostly from our parish to celebrate Holy Mass at the Shepherds' Field in Bethlehem. The city of Bethlehem today is walled by the Israeli government, but life continues for the residents and the pilgrims, albeit difficult. The wall serving as a reminder of the tense relationship between Palestinians and Israelis. Nevertheless, the message of the angel to the shepherds uttered two thousand years ago continues to reverberate to us today: "Glory to God in the highest and peace to people of goodwill." On our way to the Shepherds' Field, something struck me as Bishara, our Tour Guide, was sharing to us the reason that God chose the shepherds as his first heralds. Think of them, he said, as the best way to disseminate information. God wanted this great news to be known by everybody; He wants all to experience it. For a people that feels boxed in by the Wall of separation, the Lucan account is appealing. Jesus came as a poor baby to a poor woman who was promised that this child would topple the powerful and bring justice to those most in need of it.

You may have another take on the story. Perhaps, you are more comfortable with continuity and change. Matthew's account may be more appealing to you: Jesus is the one who stays within his tradition but improves it. Whatever situation you are in right now, may you find something in the story that would speak to you. Whether Luke or Matthew, all agree that Jesus was a living, breathing person, alive as you or me. Christmas celebrates this incredible reality, God so loved us that He wants us to touch His love tangibly. God wants you to know that He is always with you and understands you. If this Christmas is difficult for you, know that this baby, born in a manger, grew up to be an adult, suffered and died, in order to tell you that God really "gets it."

On behalf of the parish staff, Sister Necy, Sister Linda, Deacon Michael and Elizabeth Ho, and Fatima, we wish you all a blessed Christmas and prosperous New Year.

We would like to thank the Very Rev. Msgr. Terence D'Souza for celebrating some of our Holy Masses this Christmas. Msgr. Terence has been a great help and inspiration to us.
