

# FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

A discussion took place among my family in Toronto on how we are going to celebrate Thanksgiving weekend. Someone suggested that we just prepare roast beef and chicken, which I vehemently objected, even threatened not to participate if we do not have at least a small turkey for Thanksgiving dinner. I do not care for turkey that much, but it is a symbol of Thanksgiving. As a priest, I am very particular with symbols. It is what makes this meal different from all the other family meals we share throughout the year. I suspect that underneath all these discussion is the unfamiliarity of many immigrant families like ourselves to the raison d'être of this day.

The history of Thanksgiving in Canada goes back to an English explorer, Martin Frobisher, who had been trying to find a northern passage to the Orient. He did not succeed but he did establish a settlement in Northern America. In the year 1578, he held a formal ceremony, in what is now called Newfoundland, to give thanks for surviving the long journey. This is considered the first Canadian Thanksgiving. The French settlers, who have crossed the ocean and arrived in Canada with Samuel de Champlain, also held huge feast of thanks, even sharing their food with the First Nations. During the American Revolution, the Americans who remained loyal to England moved to Canada where they brought the customs and practices of the American Thanksgiving. Parliament eventually proclaimed on January 31, 1957 that on the second Monday in October, a day of general thanksgiving to Almighty God be commemorated for the bountiful harvest with which Canada has been blessed. As immigrants to Canada, Thanksgiving Day among all the feasts we celebrate should hold a special place. Many of us have travelled a long journey to come and settle here. Canada has become our home. Those that came before us have shown us an example. We should do the same.

The Book of Blessings provides us with some prayers we might want to incorporate in our evening meal. When the family are gathered around the dinner table, the head of the family begins the sign of the Cross and exclaim: "Let us glorify the Lord who wills us with his bounty. Blessed be God for ever." Everyone should respond: "Blessed **be God for ever.**" Then the head of the family should continue by saying the following or similar words: "We gather this evening to give thanks to God for his gifts to this land and its people, for God has been generous to us. As we ask God's blessing upon the food we will share with one another, let us be mindful of those in need." Then a reading from Scripture. You may want to choose from the following: Sirach 50:22-24, Deuteronomy 8:7-18, Isaiah 63:7-9, or Luke 17:11-19 followed by Psalm 138 with the appropriate response: "I will give you thanks, O Lord, with all my heart." After a period of silent reflection. The leader or another person at the dinner table will lead in the intercessions: "The Son of God, who invites us to the Paschal feast, stands ready to help us. Let us call upon him in our need." For every petition, the response will be: "Lord, hear our prayer." The intentions are: 1) For the Church of God, that we may never cease to give thanks for all good gifts; 2) For the poor of the world, that we may share with them our food and material goods; 3) For farmers and all those who provide us with our food, that we may cherish their labor and love for the land; 4) For the world and all it contains, that God maya continue to bless creation and make all things fruitful. The members may then be invited to offer their own petitions. Each one may want to express what they are grateful for and when everybody has offered their prayers, the leader may then conclude the prayer service with the recitation of the Lord's Prayer followed by the Prayer of Blessing: God most provident, we join all creation in raising to you a hymn of thanksgiving through Jesus Christ, your Son. For generation upon generation peoples of this land have sung of your bounty; we too offer you praise for the rich harvest we have received at your hands. Bless us and this food which we share with grateful hearts. Continue to make our land fruitful and let our love for you be seen in our pursuit of peace and justice and in our generous response to those in need. Praise and glory to you, Lord God, now, and for ever. Amen.

# **CREATION SPIRITUALITY**

Our parish's Mission Statement urges us to care for the environment, and be active and faithful stewards of God's creation. Today's ecological crisis has awakened us to the urgency of seeking a new theology that deals with all creation and the need for a spirituality that encompasses the entire universe. Rooted in the Christian affirmation of the goodness of God's created universe, contemporary creation spirituality attempts to answer such a need. It is a spirituality that also draws from the wisdom of various world religions as well as those of indigenous people whose cultures have remained integrally connected with the dynamics of the earth. At its centre is the interrelatedness and interdependence of all creation on a cosmic level - a concept that is becoming ever more widely affirmed in the various disciplines of natural science.

Creation Spirituality holds that this same interdependence is true for all aspects of human life. Pope John Paul II echoes this: "In our day, there is a growing awareness that world peace is threatened also by a lack of due RESPECT FOR NATURE, by the plundering of natural resources and by a progressive decline in the quality of life...Many ethical values, fundamental to the development of a PEACEFUL SOCIETY, are particularly relevant to the ecological question."(from Peace with God the Creator, Peace with All of Creation, Message for World Day of Peace 1990). The social application of creation spirituality is based on an understanding of development and progress, where the community of people and care of the earth are both at the center. Human beings are called to enter into solidarity of universal dimensions, "a cosmic unity" animated by the very love that flows from God, our Creator. In your own way, how are you a "steward of creation? On this Thanksgiving Day, write a Litany of Gratitude for all created things.
