Jesus is the fullness God's Grace

In the Land of Persia there was a wise and beloved king. The king loved his people very much, and always desired what was best for them. He used to give a lot of gifts to his people. He wanted to find out how his people were responding to his generosity and kindness, and what was the best gift he could give to his people. So one day he disguised himself as a poor man and went to visit the public baths. The water for the baths was heated by the furnace in the cellar, so the king went to visit the man who tended the fire in the cellar. The two men talked, and the king helped him to tend the fire. Then both men shared the food, and the king became a friend to this lonely man. The king visited him every day and both became very good friends. Then one day the king revealed his true identity and the king expected the man to ask him for a gift. The poor lonely man looked into the eyes of the king with love and said: "You left your palace and your glory to sit with me in this dark place, to eat my coarse food, and to care about what happens to me. You have given yourself to me, what more can I expect from you. You became my friend. Thank you my king, and I am at your service."

This weekend we celebrate the Thanksgiving Day. It is a beautiful celebration of people gathering to recognize and appreciate one another. Keeping the societal theme on Thanksgiving, in today's liturgy, we are called to deepen our understanding on Thankfulness. The Gospel tells the stories of healing of Naaman and the Ten Lepers. Based on these readings, lets reflect on Thanksgiving with the following three words:

Grace: May God bless us. The notion of Thankfulness begins with God. God is the origin of all graces. The Grace of God is free, abundant and boundless. God does not put a limit to graces. Jesus has shown us God's grace of love and mercy. Jesus becomes for us the reality or the face of God's grace.

Generosity: Thanksgiving celebration invites us to recognize the generosity of God. God is generous in the many graces we receive. No one can buy God's grace with money or power as Naaman was tempted to do. Jesus Christ showed us how much God is generous in showing love and mercy through his passion, death and resurrection. Generosity, then, is the act of God's grace. "*God never gets tired of forgiving us*": - Pope Francis.

Gratitude: When God blesses us generously, we are invited to share God's grace with gratefulness. Gratitude is the authentic attitude we show in response to God's grace. Gratitude brings true joy and peace, and we are called to share it with everyone. During this Eucharist, and on this day of thanksgiving, let us give praise and thank God for the many blessings in our life.
