

Marriages: Marriages are celebrated in the Church where the bride or groom is registered at. When a man and a woman plan to marry each other, they should contact a priest one year in advance and always before the wedding date is set, and before arranging for the reception hall. The engaged are required to attend a Marriage Preparation Course.

Please note: However, if this man or woman has previously gone through any form of civil or religious marriage with another person, the priest is not permitted to set a date for the wedding until the Bishop's office has been consulted. Questions are often being asked about marriages performed outside the Catholic Church by non-Catholic ministers. These are not valid marriages according to the teaching of the Catholic Church, but many can be rectified by simply consulting with your Parish priest to discuss the available options. Sometimes people make decisions without proper information, so if you wish, please contact your Pastor for details or call the Marriage Tribunal at 416-934-3400 ext 300.

LENT: THE ROAD TO EASTER

PALM SUNDAY The palms we receive in Church on the last Sunday of Lent remind us that when Christ our King entered Jerusalem, the people acclaimed Him and waved palms in welcome. Have a procession during which you place blessed palms in each room of your home, saying "praise and honour to You, Lord Jesus Christ, King of endless glory. Have your family repeat the acclamation. End your procession with a discussion of what your family will do to celebrate Holy Week.

THE EASTER TRIDUUM Triduum means 3 days. The 3 days of Easter are Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter Sunday. This is the final time of preparation for Easter. One each of these 3 days we celebrate Jesus's **passion**, **death and resurrection**. Each day focusses in its own special way on this single Mystery.

HOLY THURSDAY Holy Thursday is the day of preparation for the (passing over from death to life). The Old Testament tells how the Jewish people sprinkled blood from a slain lamb on their doorposts so that the angel of death could pass over, leaving them unharmed. Each year they ate the passover meal as a celebration of freedom from Egyptian captivity. On Holy Thursday Jesus gave Passover a new and greater meaning. He Himself became the slain lamb of the Old Testament so that, by His passion, death and resurrection, all of us would pass over from death to new life.

This is new pasch was instituted a the Last Supper which our Lord ate with His twelve apostles before His death. He used the idea of sharing good to show how He was to give Himself for the world. He blessed bread and wine and gave them to all His disciples to eat and drink. These became His flesh and blood, given for the life of the world.

"Do this in memory of Me" was His command that ever afterward we would remember and re-live His self-gift. Every time we celebrate the Eucharist, we remember Jesus' passion, death and resurrection by nourishing ourselves with the body and blood He gave us. Therefore, Holy Thursday celebrates the institution of the sacrament of Eucharist.

At the same time, it celebrates the institution of the priesthood. It is the power given him by Christ which enables the priest to change bread and wine into the Lord's body and blood. The priest continues Christ's work on earth by celebrating the Mass and by ministering to people, as Jesus Himself did all during His Life. Although the priest alone is given the power to consecrate bread, and wine, all of us are commissioned to do the work of Christ. Jesus got down and washed the feet of all His disciples to show that we all are meant to be servants for one another, ordained and lay. **<u>GOOD FRIDAY</u>** Although shot through with hope in the Resurrection, it is this day on which we most sorrowfully commemorate the Lord's death.

The veneration of the cross is central to the meaning of our Good Friday service. By bringing about the resurrection, God made an instrument of healing out of an instrument of destruction (the cross). This He did for rhe sole purpose of love.

On Good Friday we acknowledge our own sin, which is our own failure to love. However, this we do with confidence because we know that God's love is greater than the sin of any human being. If we unite ourselves with Christ, all evil can be turned to good, all sorrow to joy. <u>HOLY SATURDAY</u> This is one of quiet waiting at the tomb. There is no Mass. On this, and all Saturdays of the year, we honour Mary, the mother of God, in a special way. All the apostles abandoned Jesus in His darkest hour. Mary, His mother, remained steadfast.

It is a day of great silence over the earth, but it is one of quiet expectancy, was we remember the final darkness before the dawn.

EASTER VIGIL The first celebration of Easter Sunday actually takes place on the evening of Holy Saturday. This special feast, the greatest in the entire year, is called the Easter Vigil. It celebrates the resurrection from the dead of Jesus the Christ.

The Easter Vigil is traditionally a time to renew our baptismal promises. Again we pledge our lives to Christ. We commit ourselves to follow Him through death to life.

The blessing of the Easter fire and lighting of the paschal candle symbolizes a new beginning for the world. Each person in the church has a small candle. The new fire is passed from one to the next, gradually growing to fill the whole church with light. This new light, growing in the darkness, is like the risen Christ bringing new life to the world.

Since Easter is THE feast of the year it can be truly celebrated as such by those who have prepared their hearts during Lent. Decorate your table with a baptismal robe and candle. Renew your baptismal promises as a family and talk about the paschal candle that will be seen in church at Mass on Easter and during the Easter season (and possibly on your own tables as a centre piece).

EASTER SUNDAY THROUGHOUT THE YEAR

Promises and joy do not end with Easter Sunday. Every Mass celebrates the death and resurrection of Our Lord. Every day of our lives is a chance in which to cultivate the new life won for us by Christ.
