From the Pastor's desk

Misunderstanding of Baptism

Those of you who actually read the bulletin will know that I often write on the Sacrament of Baptism and the importance of being a registered parishioner. My only hope is that you who read this, may have an occasion to bring this to the attention of those who are in the situation of contemplating a baptism and at the same time are not registered parishioners. In other words, I am "preaching to the choir". Why do I reiterate this? Frequently I am asked to baptize a child or a grandchild whose parents are not practicing Catholics and not members of this parish. I will not deny baptism. However, baptism may be deferred until the parents indicate actual interest in the faith. Baptism without any requirements, with the hope that through administering baptism the parents will suddenly become practicing Catholics has already been proven not to work by decades of attempts. In fact, this practice often makes things worse because it continues to First Communion, to Confirmation and finally to Marriage. The Sacraments are understood and compared by many in secular terms to graduation from kindergarten to elementary school to high school and so on. Baptism is the first of the Sacraments of initiation and an understanding of what baptism entails and a commitment to a life of Christian practice are necessary.

In recent years many parents have developed the habit of waiting until their child's first birthday before having their child baptized. How this practice originated, I am not certain. It could be economic and practical to "kill two birds with one stone". However, it is not sacramental or Catholic. We can take the example of Jesus being presented by his parents in the temple after forty days. Joseph and Mary didn't wait until Jesus' first birthday. I would say that a baby should be baptized within the first three months, unless there are extenuating circumstances which would dictate otherwise. If the baby is in danger of death, baptism should be administered as soon as possible. There is also the situation that, when baptism is deferred to one year or in some cases, even longer, that the child knows enough that something unusual is happening. The child will often physically resist because the child is afraid. I have had the sacred oils, towels, candles, etc. kicked into the baptism font or onto the floor by children (no longer babies) threshing in their parents' arms. This does not happen when babies are baptized.

So, if parents who are not practicing their faith and who are not registered parishioners want their child baptized, they need to fill out a parish registration form and automatic debit form and begin fulfilling their Sunday privilege of Mass attendance. At time of writing, we have just had restrictions lifted somewhat, so Mass attendance should be less of a challenge. I believe that we serve a gracious, loving God who wants each of us to fully reach the spiritual stature which God intends. Many are wounded and broken for various reasons. The road to healing begins by awareness of how precious each of us is to God. Parents are responsible for the faith development of their child during the formative years. God empowers parents to instill in their child how really incredible they are in His sight. To do

this, parents need to experience their self worth first. All of us experience this through becoming a practicing member of Christ's body, the Church, by gathering on the Day of the Lord, listening to God's word proclaimed, receiving His Body and Blood in Holy Communion and by getting to know our sisters and brothers in the faith. No doubt I will be repeating this in the future because it is a scenario which continually presents itself.

Vocational Discernment Group for Young Women

We have had a vocational discernment group for young men for many years here at St. Anthony's Parish, but never a group for young women who may be thinking about a religious vocation. I would certainly like to start such a group if there is interest in the parish. There are now 3 candidate who have expressed interest! If any young woman has an interest in religious life, please let Fr. Dominic know.

The Chair of Saint Peter the Apostle Feast day February 22

When the pope cautions world leaders, pleads for peace, or condemns social injustice, people listen and respond. What makes the world listen to this man? The answer lies in Scripture and in Tradition. Peter is named first among the apostles of Jesus; he was often their spokesman and leader; he was the first to preach after Pentecost; and he was the leader in defending Christ and his message. Peter was at the Transfiguration and in the garden.

He proclaimed to Jesus, "You are the Christ," and Christ singled him out:

"[S]o I say to you, you are Peter, and upon this rock I will build my church, and the gates of the netherworld shall not prevail against it. I will give you the keys to the kingdom of heaven. Whatever you bind on earth shall be bound in heaven; and whatever you loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven." (Matthew 16:18-19)

Jesus prayed for Peter that he might strengthen his brothers. (Luke 22:32) And Jesus gave Peter a threefold commission to "[f]eed my sheep." (John 21:15-17)

From the beginning, the specialness, or primacy, of Peter has been recognized. On the feast of the Chair of Peter, we celebrate our unity as a Church. We celebrate the love, presence, and protection of Christ for us, the Church. The title Chair of Peter refers to the chair from which a bishop presided, a symbol of his authority. When the title refers to Saint Peter, it recalls the supreme teaching power of Peter and his successors. It is from the chair, from the pastoral power given him, that the pope shepherds Christ's flock.

Luke 6:27-38 In the Gospel, Jesus teaches us how to live in the kingdom of God.





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
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
