Fifth Sunday of Easter — May 14th, 2017

From The Pastors Desk...

In these weeks of the Easter season, we have been looking at Jesus *Face to Face*, in order to get to know him a bit better. Three weeks ago we looked at Jesus' face and saw mercy. Instead of getting back at his followers for abandoning him in his hour of distress, he recreates them and shows them infinite mercy. Then, with the Emmaus story, we looked into Jesus' face and saw our playful Saviour, one who is sometimes hidden, yet is always with us. He is with us in moments of loneliness and of fullness. He nourishes us, calling us together as community and feeding us with his very Body and Blood. Last weekend, Deacon Kevin powerfully brought us face to face with Jesus as both Gate and Shepherd. Jesus gets dirty with us, risks his life for us, and protects us, even when we are smelly and lost.

This weekend we come to the clincher: If we come *face to face* with Jesus, we are coming face to face with God Almighty. That may sound rather normal for us, with almost 2000 years of collective memory that God is Trinity, and that Jesus is God. In Jesus' day, however, even the thought that a human being—even one as special as Jesus—could actually be God, the Lord of hosts, the all-powerful One, who lives in highest heaven, would have been a huge scandal. God is God, and we are humans. God is not us, and we are not God. But in the man Jesus, the One who was a threat to the religious status quo and to the Roman Empire, we see the Father. *We see God*. God, the "Rock of Ages" sung about in the old Protestant hymn. The One mentioned as "rock" in 50 verses of the Old Testament is also Jesus, who Peter calls "a living stone" in our Second Reading.

There is a story of a famous rabbi who was dressed rather shabbily, and was on a train going to give a talk in a town in Poland. One man (also on his way to the talk), thinking the rabbi to be a bum, treated him rather rudely. On arriving and meeting the rabbi, he begged forgiveness for the way he treated him on the train. The rabbi responded that he had no power to forgive the gentleman: the forgiveness had to come from a shabbily dressed street person. It seems that our God has chosen to do the same. He comes to us where we least expect him. My hope and prayer is that I may recognize that in all my relations, especially with those on the periphery of society, I come *face to face* with God.

With the Liturgy of the Word is concluded, the Liturgy of the Eucharist begins. During this transitional time, the "low" part of the Mass, we have time to re-gather our energies from the work of listening and responding so that we might prepare to give praise and thanksgiving in the manner commanded by Christ. Often, a song is sung as we prepare the altar for the celebration and we give our gifts for the support of the church and the care of the poor.

Once the collection has been taken up, representatives of the community bring up the financial donations and the gifts of bread and wine that will be transformed into the Body and Blood of Christ. In the early church, everyone brought up something: eggs, produce, chickens, grain, bread or wine. Some was used for the celebration and the rest was used for the benefit of the church so that all were taken care of and no one was in need. Now our donations are mostly financial because that is the medium of trade in today's world.

The tradition of celebrating Mothers is ancient, apparently having its origins with the Greeks and Romans, then later the English. Early Christians celebrated a "Mothering Sunday" in honour of the Virgin Mary, and then all mothers. All these ended, though, until being recreated by two ladies. Julia Ward Howe rekindled the idea shortly after the American civil war, calling on mothers to work for peace, so that their sons would never die in battle again. Then Anna Jarvis, herself childless (and inspired by her own mother's wishes), worked for an annual celebration honouring all mothers, living and dead. She later was thrilled when President Woodrow Wilson signed a resolution into law in 1914, declaring the second Sunday in May as Mother's Day. Since then it has spread to many countries in the world, including here in Canada. I find it interesting to note that Ms. Anna Jarvis herself became deeply hurt at the later commercialization of the day.

All that said, the reality is that here in Canada we do celebrate this Sunday in honour of mothers. Some of you are gifted with flowers and meals and other things from your children. Others think of their own mothers with a sense of gratitude. For still others, it is a difficult day, either because of the loss of their own mothers, or the difficulties they have had with them. Some mothers find it very hard because their children are estranged from them, and today is a bitter reminder of that loss. Others want to have children, but do not, for many different reasons. Still others are not biological mothers, but have engendered and protected life in others in many different ways, including to furry creatures.

To each and every one of you, our entire parish staff wishes you many blessings. Know that no matter how you experience Mother's Day, you are in our prayer.
