FROM THE DESK OF FR. GLASS:

Positive truth in religion.

It is considered the height of arrogance these days to claim to know the truth, especially the truth of religion. Nobody today has the right to say: "I am right and you are wrong." Our secular age demands that we religious believers demonstrate above all the virtue of being openminded. Our Muslim neighbors deny that Jesus is the Son of God and claim that Mohammed is the last and greatest Prophet. Who are we to say that they are wrong? It is true that we do not believe what they believe — otherwise we would be Muslim instead of Christian — but shouldn't we at least be open-minded enough to entertain the remote chance that they *might* be right and we *might* be mistaken?

According to the secular mind-set, we Christians are free to *believe* that Jesus is the Son of God, but it would be uncharitable to exclude the *possibility* that he is not. It is permitted to believe that we are right only if we do not exclude the possibility that we may be wrong. No one, we are told, can claim ownership to absolute truth — that would be fanaticism. In this secular age, the best we can hope for is tentative or conditional truth.

The problem is that we Christians actually do claim to *know* that Jesus is the Son of God. We know it not tentatively but with the absolute certainty of faith. And as we Catholics like to say: Faith is a certainty beyond all other certainties which excludes the lease shadow of doubt. We believe because it is true. It is Truth with a capital-T.

The disciples of secularism like to pose as neutral. They claim not to have any particular tenets. They are fair and open-minded. Yet their skepticism itself is a belief. It is too vague to be called a religion but it is just as much a matter of faith. And a faith that is intolerant of any other.

Cardinal Newman in 1879 called it "liberalism":

Liberalism in religion is the doctrine that there is no positive truth in religion, but that one creed is as good as another; and this is the teaching which is gaining substance and force daily. Never did Holy Church need champions against is more sorely than now, when, alas, it is an error overspreading, as a snare, the whole earth. But it must not be supposed for a moment that I am afraid of it. I lament it deeply, because I foresee that it may be the ruin of many souls; but I have no fear that it really can do any serious harm to the Word of God. Christianity has been too often in what seemed deadly peril, that we should fear for it any new trial now.

The Church will survive, as it has survived the past 2000 years, but what of the spiritual casualties? My own concern is that we have allowed ourselves to be bullied into submission, that we have become afraid to proclaim the truth of the Gospel. We need to be reminded of what St. Paul wrote to the Christians in Corinth: "The message about the Cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God."
