#### FROM THE DESK OF FR. GLASS:

Remembering St. John Paul II.

Pope John Paul II died on Saturday 2 April 2005, during Easter week, on the day before Divine Mercy Sunday, the feast day which he himself instituted. I was then in my second year of theology at St. Augustine's Seminary. Pope John Paul had been suffering the debilitating effects of Parkinson's disease for many years. His death was not unexpected but, all the same, we were saddened at his passing. It was as if we had lost a member of our family.

Pope John Paul was really the only Pope that I had ever known. I remember when his election was announced in 1978 — for the first time in centuries the Catholic Church had a chosen a Pope who was not Italian, but Polish! For the next twenty-seven years, an entire generation, Pope John Paul II redefined what it meant to be Pope. It was hard to imagine anyone else filling that role.

Pope John Paul II saw his main task as implementing the decrees of the Second Vatican Council. The Council was begun by Pope John XXIII and brought to its conclusion by Pope Paul VI. The next Pope, Albino Luciani, took the name John Paul as a sign of his intention to continue the work of his two predecessors. He died after only thirty-three days as Pope. Karol Wojtyla was then elected and took the name John Paul II.

Over the years, Pope John Paul II issued many key teaching documents. My copies of them are heavily underlined and highlighted because they were primary texts in our theology courses in the Seminary. Encyclicals such as *Fides et Ratio* (Faith and Reason), *Veritatis Splendor* (The Splendor of Truth), *Evangelium Vitae* (The Gospel of Life), etc., are essential to understanding the Church in the 20<sup>th</sup> century. During the Jubilee Year of 2000, Pope John Paul issued his road-map for the Church in the 21<sup>st</sup> century, *Novo Millennio Ineunte*; I have referred to this document many times and I often go back to it for guidance and inspiration.

I never met Pope John Paul II personally but he has had a huge impact on my life. At a time when I was looking for an example of faith to live by, I looked to him. There could never be any doubt about the genuineness and solidity of his faith. He certainly had a hand in the grace of my vocation.

You may have noticed the picture of Pope John Paul that now hangs at the back of the Church. When I am sitting in the Sanctuary or standing at the Altar, I can see it clearly. It is a reminder of the past — of my own spiritual journey that occurred during those eventful years of his papacy, and of the gratitude that I owe to him. It is also a reminder that the work continues. Pope John Paul II left us a road-map, but it is up to us to continue to journey along that road.

The world is changing, and not for the better. In these times the example of Pope John Paul is a reminder that faith does not accommodate itself to the culture, but rather calls the culture to conversion and transformation. Christianity is always a counter-cultural movement.
