FROM THE DESK OF FR. GLASS:

The Bible was not written for scripture scholars.

On the First Sunday of Advent we started a new lectionary cycle with the Sunday Gospel readings taken from Matthew's Gospel. Although today's reading in from Gospel of John (continuing the theme of Epiphany) next Sunday we pick up Matthew's Gospel at verse 4:12 with the calling of the disciples.

If it has been a while since you have read Matthew from beginning to end, now is the perfect time to reacquaint yourself with this Gospel. We need to remember that the Bible was not written for scripture scholars but for all the faithful. We can feel intimidated by the opinions of the scholars, but in fact they usually obscure more than they illuminate. The scriptures were written under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, and it is those who are filled with the Holy Spirit who are therefore our surest guides.

As Cardinal Ratzinger (later Pope Benedict XVI) said:

Every Catholic must have the courage to believe that his faith (in communion with that of the Church) surpasses every "new magisterium" of the experts, of the intellectuals. Their theories can be helpful in providing a better understanding of the origins of the biblical books, but it is a prejudice of evolutionistic provenance if it is asserted that the text is understandable only if its origin and development are studied.

The rule of faith, yesterday as today, is not based on the discoveries of biblical sources and layers but on the Bible *just as it is*, as it has been read in the Church since the time of the Fathers until now. It is precisely the fidelity to this reading of the Bible that has given us the Saints, who were often uneducated and, at any rate, frequently knew nothing about exegetical contexts. Yet they were the ones who understood it best.

There are many good commentaries on the Bible. We are fortunate to have Catholic scholars like Jeff Cavins, Scott Hahn, Brant Pitre, and others who, through their books and videos, help us to read the Bible. However, it is always the Saints who have the best insights. The rule of our faith is not '*sola scriptura* — Scripture alone'; rather, it is 'Sacred Scripture *and* Sacred Tradition.' Together these form a *single source* of the Church's faith. The Second Vatican Council stated that Sacred Tradition "transmits in its entirety the Word of God which has been entrusted to the Apostles by Christ the Lord and the Holy Spirit."

It is not necessary to read the Bible in its original languages, although it is indeed beneficial. One can argue the merits of the various translations. The lectionary uses the *New Revised Standard Version* (NRSV), with some corrections. Another modern translation that is more faithful to the original text is the *Revised Standard Version*, *Catholic Edition* (RSVCE). Whichever translation you use, the important thing is to 'pick it up and read it'! The Bible was not written for scholars, it was written for you.
