### FROM THE DESK OF FR. GLASS:

*Mysterium fidei* — *The mystery of faith.* 

These words are said by the priest at the consecration of the chalice during the Mass. It is not our faith that is mysterious; rather, the mystery is that Christ should make himself really present in the sacrament. At the consecration, the underlying reality of the bread and wine is changed into the reality, the "substance", of Christ — Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity — so that what remains of the bread and wine are the appearances and the physical properties only.

Cardinal Newman said of this mystery:

People say that the doctrine of Transubstantiation is difficult to believe. I grant that it is difficult, impossible to imagine — but how is it impossible to believe? For myself, I cannot say *how* it is; but I say, "Why should it not be? What's to hinder it? What do I know of substance or matter? Just as much as the greatest philosophers, and that is nothing at all." Modern science considers that phenomena [what is visible or measurable] constitute the whole of our knowledge in physics. The Catholic doctrine leaves phenomena alone. It does not say that the phenomena go; on the contrary, it says that they remain: nor does it say that the same phenomena are in many places at once. It deals with what no one on earth knows anything about, the material substances themselves.

The mysteries of faith may be above our understanding but they are never contrary to reason. We do not go to the Bible to look for an explanation of the natural sciences. As Cardinal Bellarmine said in defense of Galileo: "The scriptures tell us how to go to Heaven, not how the heavens go." Yet it is much more foolish to look for an explanation of things above nature in a science textbook. We all know the quote from *Hamlet*: "There are more things in heaven and earth, Horatio, than are dreamt of in your philosophy."

Modern culture looks at faith as itself mysterious, but it is in reality of all things the most prosaic. Faith is simply seeing things as they are. It is being in touch with reality.

Although I am Catholic to the marrow, I appreciate the seeds of wisdom in other religions. One Zen master speaks about "enlightenment" in a way that also applies to faith.

Before you attain it, it is something wonderful, but after you obtain it, it is nothing special. A Chinese poem says: "I went and I returned. It was nothing special. Rozan famous for its misty mountains; Sekko for its waters." For people who have no experience of enlightenment [faith] it is a kind of mystery, something wonderful. But if you attain it, it is just you yourself, nothing special.

Faith is not mysterious. It is by the light of faith, however, that we are able to perceive and contemplate the awesome mysteries of God and his creation, things visible and invisible, the natural and the supernatural.
